#### Editor's Column

SO I GOT MY FIREPLACE

So now I have a scrumptuous new fireplace, on the north wall of the small living room of the old Roe home built in 1910 and 1912 by Allie Shephard and Dave

And it's a dilly. And it works. Beautifully. And I have scads of waste wood from tree trimmings, house remodeling, etc., etc.

Also some from the island in Lake of the Hills, which I hope to augment somehow this fall and winter.

Drap in and look over my fireplace, built by expert George Fussman (and his crew).

However much I may rave over my fireplace masterpiece, I do have a few suggestions for anyone planning to have a fireplace built on an old house, replacing an old furnace chimney (which originally, in my naivette, I had hoped to just remodel, or add on to, or otherwise utilize the beautiful old red bricks).

1. Expect to pay about \$250.00 more than estimate from the county's best mason. Sure, it's a blow, but an expert mason is imperative, and you're lucky to even catch a glimpse of him.

2. Expect to suffer \$ 100 damage to your lawn (unless your fireplace is to be put on a side of your house directly on your driveway). The huge ready-mix cement trucks will drive down the middle of your carefully-nurtured grass, leaving four-inch-deep trenches which will have to be filled and seeded. Big trucks carrying bricks, mortar sacks, ce-ment blocks, firebricks, and tile will also drive over your grass, each one choosing a different route from the last.

3. Expect to have a carpenter come Friday evening (a master carpenter is as busy as a master mason, and is on a steady job, with overtime) and cut a fiveby-five-foot hole in your north wall just as a nasty north wind



Dr. Fred Anderson, general chairman, and Peg Gillis, out-county chairman of the 1977-78 Isabella County United Way campaign drive, announced the appointment of Phyllis Sides to head the village of Weidman; Al Clevenger, Beal City; Fred Briggson, Coldwater, Gilmore, Sherman and Nottawa Townships.

This year's drive will take place the week of Oct. 16, during which the drive goal of \$97,500 will hopefully be attained. The ambitious goal represents an increase of about 20% over last year's goal, but a realistic 6% increase above last year's drive total.

The out-county division, of which Weidman, Beal City, Coldwater Lake, Lake Isabella and the townships are part, has a goal of \$6,000, hopefully reached through donations of businesses employees, and out-county retirees. The \$6,000 in no way represents the true total donated by out-county residents to United Way, as many gifts are recorded under other divisions. Employees of school systems give to United Way via the school division.

United Way solicits persons at their places of employment, so that, except for retirees, there is not a door-to-door solicitation.

The United Way supports 13 local agencies, including Listening Ear, Crisis Center, American Red Cross, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Central Michigan Mental Health Clinic, Mid Michigan Work Activities Center, Isabella County Senior Citizens, Commission on Aging.

Also C. L. Memorial Hoagerland Workshop, YMCA, Family Counseling Service, Salvation Army, and Michigan United Way.

The contribution to Michigan United Way helps support 17 state agencies and six national agencies.

Giving the United Way means giving once instead of being solicited 36 separate times.

COTTER FAMILY REUNION HELD IN ROSEBUSH

The 77th annual Cotter reunion was held Oct. 2 at the American Legion Hall in Rosebush.

This is the fourth year for the reunion to be held there; heretofore it was held at the various lakes around the state of Michigan, and at the Frank Cotter farm in Nottawa Township; and several were held in the State of Washington, at Seattle and Portland, Oregon, and in the earlier years, in Canada and Ireland.

The Cotters and relatives participating in recent years have been descendants of the David and Eunice Cotter families.

The Cotters came to Isabella County before there was a Mt. Pleasant. There was a Salt River Village where Shepherd now is, and Isabella City (Dog Town), where the Indian Treaties of 1855 and 1864 were signed when the Cotters migrated from Livingston County with ox teams.

First purchasing land in Isabella and then Nottawa Townships, where David Cotter and his two sons, Frank and John, cleared the 80 acres and put in crops around the stumps, constituted the first family roots in Nottawa.

The Cotters and their relatives assembled at Rosebush this year in a force of something over a hundred adults and several children.

There were five generations represented, from as far away as Seattle, Wash., and Wenatchnee, Wash., the apple capital of the United States.

Mrs. Eunice Foster and her brother, Arthur L. Rogers, a retired executive of Continental Can, represented the west coast. Most were from the State of Michigan, but there were several states represented, such as Indiana, Ohio, Illinois.

The next reunion will be at Rosebush the second Sunday in

October, 1978.

Officers for 1976-77 were Will Cotter, president; Orville Cotter, vice president; and Mildred Cotter Cahill, secretary-treasurer.

New officers of 1977-78 are Orville Cotter, president; Don Cotter, vice president, both of Mt. Pleasant; and Mrs. Harold Cotter of Lansing was named secretary-treasurer.

Ethel Roethlisberger, a cousin from Mt. Pleasant, represented the oldest generation.

Pot-luck dinner was served at 1 p. m. Gerald Cotter as program chairman presented the speakers, Tim Cotter of Clare handled registrations, and name tags.

At least one death was recorded, and several new children added to the list. Histories of families were traced back to pre-Revolutionary days. Some ancestors took part in the Civil War and the Spanish War, and many were veterans of World Wars I and II, and the Viet Nam War.

A trio composed of Virginia Cotter, Ruth Cotter and Mrs. Paul Cotter led community singing of old songs and operas.

Cotter descendants who did not arrive or did not register, and anyone related and wanting notice of meetings should phone the president.

THE BOB KANINSKYS ARE DOING FINE


Bob Kaninsky, still with General Telephone Company, was going past his old home here Tuesday afternoon, and stopped in at Frances Tranbarger's for a chat.






