Today I can stuff them both out the door and leave them out in the cold and snow an hour, and they come piling in at the crack of a door---and run for their durned old litter box in the utility room.


Last fall they were learning, to their delight and mine, to dig little cat-holes in the ground and sit on 'em as needed. During the winter they've reverted to the

SERIOUSLY HURT IN SNOWMOBILE ACCIDENT

Tim McArthur was seriously injured in a snowmobile accident Sunday evening when a machine operated by Jerry Smith ran headon into a car driven by Chris

The accident occurred on West Beal City Road very near the intersection of Littlefield Road at 8.30 p.m., and the Smith snowmobile was said by Chris Straus to have no lights on, and was coursing down the roadway.

Both Tim McArthur and Jerry Smith were taken to CMC Hospital, where Jerry was treated and released. Tim was transferred to Saginaw St. Mary's for surgical correction of facial lacerations and fractures.

Tim was a passenger on the Smith machine. Bones were shattered around Tim's eyes ears, and jaws. The roof of his mouth was also torn, and Tim was scheduled for surgery Wednesday of this week.

His brother David went to Saginaw Tuesday to visit him. Tim's parents, Gene and Edith Mc-Arthur, were with him during surgery Wednesday. They hoped to bring Tim home by the last of this week or the first of next.

It improved some over the weekend, and is almost normal today (Jan. 24), but the weather man tells us there's another front coming in.


