(Editor's Note: This week we're turning over our space to a group of letter writers, subject, the public schools. Herewith is their letter:)

To the Weidman Community: Back when we were absorbed into the Chippewa Hills School District, we were told that we'd save money, and that our children would have broader educational opportunities.

Let's assess what has really happened.

Our teenagers are away from home at the very time in their lives that they need a sense of home community.

In high school, fewer children get to participate in sports events because there's just one team for the whole area now, whereas formerly there were four individual programs in sports, music, and

The same is true for all the other things we normally consider to go along with the Three R's in Junior High and High School.

Many of our children spend a large part of their day on a school bus, when they should be playing in the fresh air, helping out at home, or being busy on a part-time job.

Those things are important for preparing children for adult life.

We may have tried to save money by consolidation, but even if we did save a little, we've lost more than we saved.

Maybe we were too small to have our own district, when consolidation happened. We don't think we're too small now!

With the lakes in now, and with all the new permanent residents who have moved in, we could put together a good tax base for a decent-sized school

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

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
