
Lansing — Prolific state law makers introduced over 4,400 bills during the just complete legislative session, but only about 800 of them have been entered in the lawbooks.

That makes for about an 18 per cent efficiency rate on bills over the two-year period.

Many of the proposals were trivial and many more were duplicate bill introductions made so a second lawmaker—or political party—could claim partial credit for somebody else's good idea.

And the 4,400-odd bills were in addition to nearly 2,700 resolutions commemorating such events and observances as the 1976 International Frisbee Day and Barbara Walters' selection as the first network anchorwoman.




