Hokay. So let's all sleep better.


What wouldn't you give to hear one of our really good high school bands play an honest-togoodness Sousa march; in other words, music with melody.

ROBERT LATHAM Robert Latham died as a result of injuries suffered in an automobile accident on M-115 early Tuesday morning. He was 23.



Norval Morey discusses energy

Norval Morey, of Morbark Industries (he IS Morbark Industries), talked recently about using wood chips from waste wood in

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farm lots and cutover forests where pulpwood cutters go in and leave clutters of debris of branches and trimmings. He's proposing that Michigan power companies use wood chips for their generators' fuel, a not impractical idea. We'd like to see him come up with an invention for a light-weight, cheap and relatively safe wood piece or log (including the 17-inch pieces for old wood-burning kitchen ranges). With his genius for labor-saving devices and salvage of waste material (wood chips are now being used in various ways of manufacture), we think he could come up with a household log that would be cheap enough for the average home-owner (not in the \$40,000 class) to use.



Sonny cuts his own wood and hauls it, and also chops it. The room is called an enclosed patio, but it's snug as a bug in cold weather, with that wood stove going. (It has a fireproof brick wall behind it. Sonny says he got up one cold day recently, turned up the thermostat on his oil-fired furnace, and went out and built a wood fire in the Franklin stove. The oil furnace ran for 45 minutes and then shut off for the day. The wood stove in the enclosed patio adequately heats the whole house. He says the furnace used just 119 gallons of oil in 47 days this winter. That's getting down to conservation, we say.

steel--it's a dark-red color, blending beautifully with the rest of the building. Sonny worked with Alvin Wilson, an independent builder living south of Mt. Pleasant. Materials for the "A-frame" roof for a 14'x70' trailer home included 2x6 trusses, corrugated sheet metal 38''x8', and facial trim. The material cost \$1,600. But--Sonny's roof will never need painting, nor a new shingle job. He says the colors of the material he used come in white, green, and the dark red he chose. He says an "A-roof' eliminates wind rumbles, so prevalent in trailer homes with flat roofs. The roof also is easier on fuel bills, as it helps keep the house warm. And the trailer-house with an A-roof is a stronger unit in high winds. Messenger photos

GRASS FIRES PLAGUE FIRE DEPARTMENTS

The Nottawa and Sherman Volunteer Fire Department is among many others being plagued by the more-than-usual grass fires.

Saturday afternoon the local Firemen were called out to a grass fire east of the Lake Isabella airport.

Last Thurday they were called to a field-fire about a mile north of M-20.

The Nottawa and Sherman Volunteer Fire Department was called to the Bill Block home on Baseline Road shortly before noon Tuesday when strong winds caused a wire on a nearby power pole to short against another wire and started a fire on the power pole.

The fire reached the Block home when the wind carried burning embers from the pole to the house. Local Firemen managed to save the house from total destruction, with damages estimated at about \$10,000. This included some water damage in the house.

A burning permit is mandatory at this time of year, and is in effect now for all planned fires except those in safety-approved containers.

You can get a burning permit by calling Merle Aldrich of the DNR, ph. 773-5713.

Object of the burning permit law is to let the DNR and other capable agencies know location of planned burnings so they can be on the alert to help if needed.

That's all there is to the burning permit. It's to let expert fire fighters know where you're planning to start a trash or brush fire so they can help if needed.
