PREVENT FOREST FIRES, SAYS THE DNR

The Department of Natural Resources says: "We have so many reasons to protect our forests and grasslands: America needs its outdoor recreation sites, its clear clean water, its trees that yield wood, its grass to feed livestock, its food and homes for wild life. All these are destroyed by forest and grassland fires.

"Nine out of 10 forest and grassland fires are preventable, being caused by people who are careless or wilfully negligent for a fatal instant with their cigarets, matches, campfires, grass, brush, and trash fires.

"In a nation with a dramatically growing population, and with more leisure time, better roads and more dollars to spend, forests and other outdoor areas are more important to more people than ever before.

"Check your burning barrel or other burner for holes larger than three-quarters of an inch in diameter, and for good covering device, and place them away from burnable material: grass, leaves, etc.

Contact Mt. Pleasant 773-5713 for burning permits in Isabella County (mandatory!) outside of villages and cities with organized fire departments. It may be more

convenient for some to call the DNR at Harrison or Gladwin. Permits are not required if burning is in an approved container. Office hourse are normally 8 a.m. to 5. p.m.



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




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
