TAXPAYERS STATEWIDE ARE TURNING DOWN MILLAGES

A note to the Board of Education and administration of the Chippewa Hills Schools, and also to those sincere people who have worked to get millages upped in the district:

Don't feel bitter against your friends and neighbors in the various towns and countrysides if the millage proposal coming up again in June does not pass.

Chippewa Hills District is not alone in turning down millage proposals. Districts all over the state are saying, "No more raises in taxes!" and they vote down any and all millage-enlargement proposals.

Property everywhere is soaring in taxable valuation even though it may not be salable at the price set by county and state tax moguls. Ergo, taxation on property everywhere is going up every year, even if millage for schools is held at present levels.


Taxpayers see school personnel, from administrators and teachers to bus drivers and custodians, going up and up on annual pay raises.

The taxpayer gets no pay raise-unless he happens to work at Dow in Midland or at an auto factory. (In which case, he probably owns a home and lot on Lake Isabella, and all lake property is being assessed sky-high, bigger every year. So, even if he's getting \$6 to \$8 an hour in a factory, his home property-tax goes up-up.)

All over Michigan, school districts are being denied millage boosts, by vote of the taxpayers (even with non-taxpayers voting on tax propositions for other people to pay).


So-it's not just this school district. It's a state-wide, if not a nation-wide, tax revolt, in a limited way. The land-owner can't do much about tax assessments and tax payments, except






