At Lansing we stood for half an hour in City Hall, munching donuts and sipping coffee while a high school band did its stuff just outside the open doors.


And we couldn't sit down!

THREN TO GET TRAINING

IN U. S. AIR FORCE Ron W. Thren, husband of Mrs. Cindy Thren of Mt. Pleasant, has entered the U.S.Air Force's Delayed Enlistment pro-

According to Master Sergeant Marty Ragnone, the Air Force recruiter in Mt. Pleasant for this area, Ron will begin four years' active duty in May, undergoing six weeks of basic training at Lackland Air Force Base in Texas.

The Air Force has guaranteed than he will then receive training as a weapons mechanic, attending courses at Lowery Air Force Base in Colorado for approximately six to 12 weeks.

He will load nuclear and nonnuclear air munitions and explosives and propellent devices on aircraft; and maintain, install, modify and repair aircraft bomb, rocket and missile release and launch, suspension and monitor systems; guns and gun mounts; and related air-munitions handling, loading and test equipment.

On completion of these courses he will be assigned to his guaran teed base at Sawyer Air Force Base in Marquette, Mich., for a four-year term. --0---

The Sunday School also consisted of a boys' class of about the same number as the girls', an adult class, and a primary class, plus the teachers, superintendent, organist, choir, etc.

The Sherman City Church was a very active part of the community in those days. The Christmas programs and Children's Day programs, and the Sunday School picnic were the high-lights of the course.


