You said you'd like to meet him to compliment him on his


writing, etc.

Hello to me. Then I introduced you to him. Guess he felt kinda warm--from having met an admiring reader.



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#### ALVA CUMMINS, 84, RECALLS OLD DÁYS

Opal Denslow visited Alva Cummins and his wife last week, and Alva told her about something of the old, old days.

Alva said he worked in the woods (cutting down trees or sawing logs) when he was 13 years old, to help support his family.

The woods boss told his men that none of them could chop wood like Alvie, who used an axe. The others used saws.

That was 71 years ago. There were eight children in Alva's folks' family, and a diphtheria epidemic struck this area about the time he was a

young teenager.
Alva's father "pulled the family through" the diphtheria sickness with home remedies, Alva says. (There were no doctors around here, or if there was one, he covered a huge territory and was out with horse and buggy making house calls most of the time. There were no telephones, and messages to the doctor's office had to be taken "by hand".)

Alva's father, during that diphtheria illness, swabbed his familys' throats three times a day with a mixture of gum of myrrh and gum of quack, mixed with grain alcohol.

He said the white blotches on their throats were serious, but the mixture "cut off" the blotches. He saved the eight kids and the mother.

The doctor from Blanchard drove his horse and buggy over to the Cummins home and want-







Burial was in the Forest Hill Cemetery at Horr.

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

The Weidman United Methodist Church has undergone many changes and improvements since the Lynches' arrival, and the new \$44,000 Methodist parsonage on Lake Weidman is the culmination of the efforts of the congregation and the minister and his wife.

Rev. Lynch's last sermon here will be preached June 12, and they will leave during the following week.

As for the church building, the basement has been painted, the entrance renovated, the sanctuary upstairs redone, rugs have been installed in various halls through the church.

"The only details remaining unchanged are the church's back entrance and the pastor's office," Rev. Lynch told the Messenger.

Different pews have been installed, the church has a new bell tower with inside chimes, and the church has been painted from yellow to white.

The old parsonage was carpeted three years ago. Last fall the church's membership was practically doubled, from the time Rev. and Mrs. Lynch took over the pastoral duties here. The membership is greatly enlarged by people from Lake Isabella.

"Weidman people have been very industrious, and have helped so much," Rev. Lynch said in an interview. "Without them, we couldn't have done any of it."

He said the family room at the church is the one he' nost fond

of--it has changed the whole aspect of board meetings and other assemblies, he said.

The Lynches' new pastorate will be the Casco United Methodist Church eight miles out of South Haven, with a membership of 235, and a regular attendance of 140. "We hope to do something about that," Rev. Lynch said.

His new church is all modern, and all paid for. A new parsonage next door to it will be completed some time about autumn, according to present plans.

Rev. and Mrs. Lynch meantime will live in the old parsonage, in a community called "Leisure".

They have many friends here who wish them the best of all good things in their new home and church.





o the Editor: I would like to take this time address myself to the citizens f Isabella County. First I would like to ask them

few questions.

1. Mothers of children who ride anTran or Dial-a-Ride to chool or anywhere on a daily asis, can you really entrust your aildren's lives to them?

I had an incident occur with a VanTran bus full of special education children April 26, 1977, which has inspired me to write this letter.

The bus of which I am speaking backed out of a driveway and over two mail boxes and a Morning Sun box.

If it had been a tight backing area it might be understandable. but it wasn't, so there was no reason for it. I called VanTran early that evening and found out the driver had never even reported it.

The following Friday I went to VanTran and was given the runaround. I then went to the Sheriff's office to see if an accident report had been filed. They called VanTran and VanTran said they felt there was not enough damage done to warrant an accident rpoert. On another occasion I was riding on a Van Tran bus and it was doing 65 m.p.h. around curves.

Taxpayers, could we get away with destroying mail boxes and not filing an accident report? Is this the type of justice we have? The big companies with money can get away with anything and we small taxpayers get away with nothing.

2. Citizens of Isabella County, can you depend on your Sheriff's Department to be there in an

emergency?

I say No! On April 29, 1977, I called the Sheriff's Department at 2 p.m. with a complaint of two men lighting fires behind my home and bothering my babysitter while I was at work. I left work immediately and went home.

I was quite worried. Who knew what I would find when I got home?

Needless to say, I beat the Sheriff's Department there. I again called at 3.30 p.m. and my complaint was still sitting on the desk. It had never been turned over to a deputy. They said they didn't know the area well enough to find our home. Yet they knew the area well enough to find us a week later to serve us with some papers with our previous address on them.

Is this the way our Sheriff's Department should be run? I say No. Where is the protection that is supposed to be provided us? I tried talking to the Sheriff, but as usual he was unavailable.
