Leon and Carol Schafer (and entire family) are getting ready to open an archery range in the building vacated by the Weidman Pharmacy when it moved to its new building.


Leon and Carol (and family) already have a thriving bait and sport shop in an addition built on the south side of their home.



Official charged with embezzling

According to the Aug. 30 issue of the Mt. Pleasant Morning Sun, Delmar Gieseler, Coldwater Township Treasurer the past 16 1/2 years, was arrested and charged this week Monday with embezling more than \$24,430 from the township's tax rolls.

Delmar, a 63-year-old farmer in the far northwest corner of the county and Coldwater Township, stood mute, according to the Sun, as he was charged with four counts of embezzlement and three counts of falsifying tax records for Coldwater Township.

Even though Delmar Gieseler allegedly has paid back most of the \$24,430 he is accused of embezzling, a spokesman for State's Attorney Frank Kelly said his actions were "still ille-

Delmar's arrest Monday by the local audit division of the State Treasury Department and the State Police ended a 10months' investigation into the Coldwater Township books by the local auditing division.

The investigation began in October, 1976, according to the account, when a routine biennial audit showed discrepancies on the tax rolls.

The spokesman said it appeared that \$18,907.97 was missing for the three-year period covering 1973, 1974 and 1975.

Prior to the audit, according to the Sun's report, Delmar was repaying the money taken from the tax rolls, in a period stretching from May 12, 1976, till the five days before the biennial audit Oct. 8.

Although the Sun said it appears he had taken \$18,907 over a three-year period, the spokesman said that all but \$119.19 had been paid back to the tax rolls.

The Morning Sun said there also was at least \$5,523.86 missing from the township treasury for 1976, but it said the figure could reach as high as \$9,479.77. The spokesman said there are also three unsigned and unendorsed checks made out to Gieseler in the township treasury.

Township Clerk Norman Geas-

ler was quoted by the Sun as saying he never doubted Gieseler's honesty when it came to keeping the township's money.

Coldwater Township Supervisor Lewis Bowen was quoted by the Sun as saying he was surprised to hear of the large monetary figures involved.

"I knew they were investigating, but I didn't know it was that big, Lewis is quoted as telling the Morning Sun.

Lewis said he may ask the Township Board of Trustees to ask for Gieseler's resignation if he does not resign voluntarily. Louie's request would be for the next meeting of the Township Board, the Sun said.

"He's a good friend of mine," Louie is quoted as saying, "but I can't tolerate that kind of thing."

Louie went on: "I went to school with him, and I always figured he was honest. He comes from a religious family. When I first heard it, I couldn't believe it!"

According to the Sun, a preliminary examination into the charges will take place in District Court in Mt. Pleasant Sept. 28. Delmar Gieseler was released on a \$70,000 personal recognizance bond.

According to the Sun, the penalty for embezzlement carries a fine up to \$5,000 and a prison sentence of up to 10 years.

Charges of forging public records carry a maximum prison term of 14 years.

Neither the State Police, who the Sun said arrested Delmar Gieseler or the prosecutor's office could be reached for confirmation of the Sun's story.

In a telephone interview Tuesday evening, Louie Bowen said, "The Morning Sun people called me last night, and after we got through tralking, I told them that they'd told me more about the whole thing than I ever knew before."

Louie confirmed the Sun's statement that he would ask for Delmar's resignation from the Township Board.



NATURE CENTER SPONSORS SOLAR COURSE

Jordan College and the Chippewa Nature Center believe home owners can reduce heating costs by harnessing solar energy.

To that end, they are co-operatively offering a mini-course entitled, "How You Can Build, Install and Understand Solar Heating Systems", to be held at the Chippewa Nature Center at Midland Friday and Saturday, Oct. 21 and 22.

Participants in the course will receive a manual, blueprints, handouts, instructor consultation, and meals. Registration for the course is now open on a first-cone, first-served basis. Jordan College, a small liberal-vocational arts school, located in Cedar Springs near Grand Rapids, constructed its first solar building (on any college or university campus in the midwest) in 1975. Its Research and Development Department is credited with two inventions now marketed by industry: a central air-handling system, and a solar absorber panel.

Recently a \$123,000 grant was received by Jordan College from the Energy Research and Development Administration to construct a liquid transport solar system, the only such grant awarded a midwest college.

Another grant, from the Dyer-Ives Foundation, has enabled 2,700 school children to tour the Jordan campus solar projects this year, and over 700 people have attended their solar mini-courses held statewide this year.
