Editor's Column

By Connie WHEN "THEY" TAKE OVER THE TOWNSHIP OFFICES

According to word from Mt. Pleasant county offices, it won't be long before all township offices are done away with and our tax affairs, ordinances, everything, will be created, judged and declared law in Mt. Pleasant.

According to word from there, it won't be too long in Mt. Pleasant, either. Shortly, according to county officials, the State of Michigan will take over the whole shebang and handle our private and especially land-tax affairs from Lansing.

And then what?

On to Washington? Where computers give you all the figures on your life, financial status and tax obligations?

We dunno.

But we hear increasingly from township officers that Mt. Pleasant is telling them their days are numbered.

What can we do about it? I'll tell you.

Write letters.

Writer identical letters, if you will, to the Governor of Michigan, and County Treasurer Jaynice Bierschbach. The address of the Governor, of course, is simply, "Lansing, Mich." That will get him.

Jaynice's address should be the County Building, Mt. Pleasant.

The letters I sent out all said the same thing, simply, "Please give me all details of the planned takeover of township offices by county units and possibly a little later, by the State of Michigan."

That's all you need to say. Be sure to give your address in full (and name, of course), including your zip code. (The postoffice has become an automated robot and increasingly is relinquishing any personal contact with its own people.)

So--please write at least the Guv'ner and County Treasurer Jaynce Bierschbach, asking for full information.

Our township officials are our last link of personal contact with

---0---BETTER THAN A LETTER NOTTAWA AND SHERMAN FIRE-MEN ARE GOING TO SCHOOL

Yes, it's true. The Firemen of the Nottawa and Shemran Townships' Fire Department started school Jan. 12 at the Weidman School.

Their teachers are L.J. Pickens and Bill Savage from Mt. Pleas-

This is a state-wide schooling which all Fire Department Firemen should take. At this date we have 19 Firemen from our Fire Department taking the schooling, and four Firemen from outside Fire Departments attending classes in Weidman.

When the schooling is finished, the Firemen will have taken 66 hours of fire and life-saving training. And the Nottawa and Sherman Volunteer Fire Department will become a credited Fire Department in the state's books.

Any Fireman wishing to sign up may still do so, on Saturday, Jan. 21, when classes start at the Weidman School at 9 a.m. and last until 4.30 p.m., same day.

This is one C.P.R. (cardiac arrest revival) that all Firemen must take. They are allowed to miss only two schooling dates, but could make up the date missed by attending Winn's school, which will fall on a different day than our dates.

So come out, you Firemen, this is your school for your own good. Listed below are subjects you will be taking, and the number of hours required to pass:


