Following is a list and explanation of the various proposals that will be on the ballot come November 7.

Please clip and save this list. You can take it with you into the voting booth, to keep track of the many proposals, which very likely will be listed merely as "Proposal A," Proposal B', and so on. Here they are:

Proposal A: Will ask voters if they want another constitutional convention to rewrite the state's constitution.

Proposal B would institute a system of mandatory minimum criminal sentences in Michigan.

Proposal C would allow the state to diversify its practice of investing state funds on the open market.

Proposal D would raise the drinking age limit from 18 to 21. The age limit was raised recently by the legislature to 19, but backers of Proposal D feel it should be age 21.

Proposal E, the Headlee Amendment, would limit state spending to its current ratio against total state personal income, and limit property assessment increases to the cost of living.

Proposal G would permit State Police to engage in collective bargaining; i.e., to join a union.

Proposal H would do away with property taxes as the primary source of school funding, raise the state income tax to compensate for the lost money and permit state-approved parochial schools to receive state aid in addition to state aid given to public schools.

Proposal J, the Tisch proposal, would cut local property assessments in half and raise the state income tax to compensate for lost revenue.

Proposal K would toughen parole practices of the state.

Proposal M would replace the state highway department with the state transportation commission, and permit 10 percent of state transportation funds to be used for public transit, the other 90 percent guaranteed for highway construction and improvement.

Proposal R lets the state issue bonds worth \$175 million for railroad improvement.

CHIP HILLS READING PROGRAM GETS BOOKS, ETC.

Through the generosity of the Xerox Education Publications, the Chippewa Hills Area Reading Is Fundamental (R.I.F.) program has received more than 30,000 paper-back and hard-bound books and audio-visual aids.

Xerox has donated more than 11,500,000 books and audio-visual aids to R.I.F. programs in the United States. Chippewa Hills was one of eight R.I.F. programs in Michigan and one of 400 in the nation to receive the benefits of Xerox's program this year.

R.I.F. is a national, non-profit program designed to motivate children to read by giving them inexpensive paper-bound books. This year, thanks to Xerox, pos-

ters and records also will be distributed to over 1,300 Chippewa Hills area children participating in pre-school programs, such as story hours in township libraries, kindergartens and all children in the community from age three

Special programs also are planned for Junior High and the High

School buildings. Morton Township Library, the Gladys McArthur Library in Weidman, Wheatland Library and the Barryton Library, adult-education classes, and other programs will receive books from Xerox.

Last year, with the co-operation of local people and service groups, the Chippewa Hills area R.I.F. raised \$800. For every dollar raised locally, the National R.I.F. puts up a matching amount. In addition, R.I.F. also receives a 60 to 70 percent discount from certain publishers. This enables R.I.F. to distribute quality books for children to select themselves and keep. All monies raised are used only for the purchase of books for chil-

Floyd Hoffman, who lived on North Sherman Road which borders the Coleman Road, died last week Monday afternoon from injuries suffered in a farm-tractor accident on his place in Coldwater Township.

He was 71.

He was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident, by a medical examiner from CMC Hospital in Mt. Pleasant.

The accident occurred about 10 a.m. in one of the Hoffmans' fields bordering the Coleman Road. Apparently, he was trying to extricate weeds clogging a potato picker when his left pant-leg caught in the power-implement's drive shaft.

He was seen by a motorist on the Coleman Road who shouted to another worker in the field to shut off the tractor.

Funeral services for Floyd Hoffman were held last Wednesday at 1 p.m. from the Pine Grove Taber nacle near Remus, with Rev. Le-Roy Bruce officiating. Burial was in the Sherman City Cemetery.

He was born June 1, 1907, in the farm home where he lived all his life.

SCHOOL TEACHERS (Continued from Page 1)

Gave much more generous insurance coverages to teachers and their entire families, from, as the school put it, Super Med 1 to Super Med 2, which in English means much wider health-insurance coverage for all teachers and their families.

The old health-insurance policy covered 80 percent of all healthproblem expenses after a \$50 deductible fee.

The new contracts call for 90 percent coverage for teachers and their families. The "health insurance" also covers accidents to teachers and/or their families.

Also included in the new contracts is a prescription-drug insurance card that formerly cost teachers \$1, now reduced to 50 cents. Prescription insurance pays

for all prescription drugs ordered by doctors.

In infinitesimal gains, the School Board defined sabbatical leave, throwing up a few restrictions on same; the Board gained the right to demand that teachers supervise children before and after school, a new wrinkle.

That's about it, for "gains" or advantages for the Board and taxpayers.

"The Board rarely gains in any strike-negotiations," Superintendent Laverne Alward said in a telephone conversation last week.

Average salaries for all teachers in the district are \$12,900,


