By Connie LET'S GET AT THAT OIL AND GAS "RESERVE"

There's a fascinating piece in the November issue of National Geographic, all on untapped and newly-discovered, practically unlimited amounts of gas in hitherto unsuspected strata at great depths.

At least two major oil companies are reported to be planning projects in drilling so-called deep wells for gas--in the 30,000 to 50,000-foot depth areas, hitherto untried by drillers.

Usually, and traditionally, gas wells are relatively shallow drillings. Now oil-company and government scientists have discovered untold stores of natural gas in hitherto unknown and unsuspected rock formations, or "impacted strata" or so far unknown or ignored earth formations.

Now some major oil companies --and a flock of independent drillers--are planning gas wells to depths of 50,000 feet, with variations back to 15,000 and 25,000

Newly-discovered areas lie practically all over the United States, including Michigan.

So, what are we waiting for? We're waiting for major drilling companies to get going on these

newest discoveries of imprisoned gas in hiterto unsuspected strata;

and deep strata, at that. Meanwhile, gas companies, including Michigan Consolidated, keep on raising rates and we poor dummies keep on paying higher and higher gas bills. (I stopped there for a few moments, to light fires in Ma's old kitchen range

and in my gold-plated fireplace. Wood-burning is our best recourse during the waiting period for abundant (and lower-priced, we hope!) natural gas.

So we burn wood. It's probably the most satisfying heat, after all, of any we have today. Try a fire (Continued on Back Page)

MARTIN AND MAGGIE BOGER: FIFTY YEARS ON AN HISTORIC AREA HOMESTEAD FARM

(Editor's Note: We have asked Virginia (Boger) Herman to write something of the history of the Boger homestead farm, on the occasion of the Golden Wedding anniverysary of her parents, Martin and Maggie Boger, to be observed this next Sunday, Aug. 25.)

By Virginia Herman My great-grandparents, Solomon they had settled here. and Margaret Shilling, were the

original homesteaders of the farm, from oldest to youngest, were as on which my parents, Martin and Maggie Boger, now live.

The year was probably 1870 when Solomon Shilling brought his family from Athens County, Ohio, in a covered wagon, and, after a two-year stay near Hastings, Mich., came north and claimed an 80-acre plot in Coldwater Township.

Under the Homestead Act of 1862, it was possible to establish ownership if 80 acres of the land was lived on for three consecutive years.

About 1877 Solomon and his brother-in-law, Washington Brown, walked to Ionia, the county seat, and made application for ownership of the property.

A deed dated June 15, 1877, and signed by Rutherford B. Hayes. President of the United States, was given to establish ownership.

Seven children were brought to Michigan in the covered wagon, and four more were born after

The children, listed in order

follows: Louisa (Mrs. Henry Boger), John, George, Mary, Milton, Rose (Haskins, Emma Middlesworth's mother), Emma, Alvia, Orra (Mrs. Orra Sisco), Artemecia (Mrs. Clinton Jones), Artminda (Mrs. John Bazaire).

To shelter the family, a sturdy house was built of logs cut practically on the spot.

The logs were hand-hewn, with axes, and fitted together at the corners of the house.

The logs then were chinked with mortar made of lime and sand that is intact today.

The shaved shingle roof lasted until 1933.

The house was two stories high. The downstairs was one large living room and two small bedrooms. The living room, of course, contained the wood-burning kitchen stove and the large family eatingtable.

A narrow stairway led to the upper level, which was one large sleeping room. At one time a

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

(Except, if millions of trillions of cubic feet of natural gas are really brought up from the deep earth, and companies see fit to distribute it at payable prices. Even then, when your gas furnace turns itself off at the command of your thermostat, there's no heat, period. A wood fire gives and gives.)

Wood, for my money, is the answer to high-priced natural gas for heating homes; until enough natural gas is produced (probably years ahead) to give it to us at really reasonable prices.

Even then, we'll light up Ma's kitchen stove and the fireplace now and then, just for pure satisfaction.


