

SAVINGS BOND SALES AT 32-YEAR HIGH

According to L.A. Johns, president of Isabella Bank & Trust in Mt. Pleasant, Isabella County chairman for the United States Savings Bond program, "Americans purchased nearly eight billion dollars' worth of U.S. Savings Bonds during 1977, the highest annual total ever recorded in peacetime."






