



Last Thursday and Friday, all stores except Baumann's IGA were closed, and all businesses stopped cold by the blizzard that swept through here, the aftermath of a big one beginning in Kentucky.

We weren't as bad off as downstate, though.

In Detroit, everything also was stopped. In Indiana the National Guard was called out to retrieve stranded motorists on interstate highways.

Electric power went off in most of the downstate areas. Here it didn't--for which we offer due thanks. Even the REA was uninterrupted around here.

But we were relatively lucky, although we reserve the right to beef about two days of immobility and isolation.

Labeled the worst winter storm ever encountered downstate, it has been compared here to storms of 1947 and 1936.

In Weidman, only three business places remained open: Vic's gas station, Keith Baymann's IGA Store, and Weaver's Village Inn.

The IGA store was opened by Larry McArthur and Ruth Pung, both of whom could walk to the store, and who did their best to maintain the huge establishment and accommodate sparse customers--mainly those grabbing cartons of milk, and bread.

Vic said he was on the job both days of the Blizzard, "But I didn't have much to do, of course," he remarked.

Road crews have been working nearly 'round the clock trying to clear clogged roads. At one point (Friday, we think it was), it was reported that three county road trucks with snowplows were stuck on the Coleman road north of town.

Road crews worked Sunday to finish the job of cleanup and beginning to clear side roads.

About eight inches of new snow was added to our winter supply during the progress of the storm, This, of course, added to the work for county road trucks.

Weidman village was cleared of snow on sidewalks and main road by Saturday afternoon,



No serious accidents or deaths were reported in this immediate area, practically a record for such an emergency.

Beal City stayed open, as to business places, all during the storm and on Saturday.

"Well, we've got farmers nearby with four-wheel machines, and we have something of our own methods of keeping our street clean," Walter Rau said in a telephone interview. "We got along fine. Everything in business places was open, and boy, did we have a rush of business! People from Coldwater Lake and even from Weidman came over on snowmobiles and got everything from groceries to auto supplies."

Beal City has a name for being highly self-sufficient, and also in being able to take care of its own emergencies.

In Weidman, the postoffice and the bank closed Thursday and Friday, for the first time in the history of the town.




