Now, of course, there's a pile of cleanup to be done, on lawns and gardens and such.


What the heck, though! We did get rid of those nasty piles of snow we lived with for so long!





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


DR. JOHN L. KNIGHT Evangelist





It was stated that a "teacherparent conference" might well take place in a food-store aisle as in a classroom.

The town uses the school buildings every day in the week, including evenings, "for everything from receptions to family reunions."

We congratulate Lakeview on its schools and its kids' SAT ratings. Only one other school in Michigan could compare to Lakeview, and that is Detroit Country Day, a private school.

Maybe someday we'll all get back to teaching "basics" before baloney. ---0---

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

In his new appointment, George will be responsible for liaison between the 29 community colleges in Michigan and the State Senate, which appropriates approximately \$125,000,000 per year for operations of the community colleges.

He will meet with Boards of Trustees and presidents of the 29 community colleges, and determine specific problems of education there, and how the state should become involved in those problems.

"There are bound to be financial problems in all schools," he said in an interview this week, "because of declining or stabilizing numbers of students coming out of high schools."

His responsibilities this year will be concerned only with community colleges and private schools entirely, he said, but he will also be involved in the problems of taking community service programs and moving them into the academic cate-

gory, i.e., the liberal arts and sciences, vocational and technical programs, and the health sciences.

He will begin work in Lansing the last week in May, and will live in East Lansing, where he plans to finish his Master's Degree work at MSU. He goes to Denver, Colo., May 8, to meet with community college liaisons all through the United States and compare their operations with those in the Michigan community colleges.

His appointment officially took place a week ago, though the job has been in the offing since last fall, delayed due to illnesses of two members of the Senate Appropriations Committee. Technically, he will work under the agency of the Senate Fiscal Agency.

He has been at Mid Michigan Community College seven years, during which time that college has risen from financial chaos to high-ranking fiscal and curricula ranking.

Because of his absence, Mid Michigan Community College underwent quite a thorough administrative renovation, since George's financial management office had to be taken over by some other person or branch of the college administration.

During his three-week vacation George says he plans to do some fishing with his father, Elwood Miller, "just around this area," and otherwise relax and get ready for quite a big step up.
