It's a miracle church. \*\*\*\*


IT'S DEER COUNTRY ALL OVER WEST ISABELLA COUNTY

It's not only the North Woodruff Road that's endangering the lives of motorists as deer dash madly in front of vehicles, although we do believe the Woodruff Road two-mile stretch just north of Weidman is really the worst.


In the two-mile really hazardous stretch of Woodruff Road, there are deep ditches on either side of the roadway, and deer runs crossing the road--which deer will follow whether it's winter or summer.

But other really hazardous spots include all of the area (roads) surrounding the Ojibwa Recreation Area; that small stretch of road south of Weidman where Coldwater Road makes a steep curve around the place where the old railroad used to be; and the entrance to the intersection of Coldwater Road and M-20, which is heavily wooded.

MEMORIAL SERVICES AT SHERMAN CITY CHURCH

Memorial services will be held at the newly rebuilt Sherman City Church this year, for the first time in many years.

Friends and relatives will assemble at the church at 12.30 p.m. Sunday, May 28, and walk to the cemetery with a parade and honor guard from the Farwell VFW.

They will disperse at the cemetery after appropriate short services.

At 2 p.m. there will be services at the church, with an appropriate program.

Several ministers will be there. Rev. Dimmick of the United Methodist Church of Weidman will deliver a sermon.

Other ministers hoping to be present include Father Neubecker, retired priest of the Beal City Church; Rev. John Wright, retired pastor of the Weidman Church of the Nazarene; Rev. Marvin Eldridge, pastor of the Weidman Baptist Church; and Rev. Wayne Lyons, pastor of the Church of God at Barryton. Also invited is the pastor of the Brinton Chapel.

Other details of the program include group singing, special music, a report on future plans for the church, and brochures of the history of the restoration of the church, which will be handed out to those present at the services.

These are the high points of the first service in the Sherman City Church in at least 38 years.

The church property was given to the village of Sherman City in 1904 by Gilbert Johnson, a major lumberman. His wife, Clara, also signed the deed.

Everyone from all denominations is very welcome at the church for the Memorial Day services. An urgent invitation is extended to all people everywhere to attend.

This will be the first service at the church in many years.

Music for the program will be enhanced by an electric organ loaned by an area family.


BEAL CITY FFA NEWS ITEMS Monday, May 15, Beal City High School was the site of the FFA's annual awards program. Many awards were presented.


