WE FELT THE COLD HERE LAST WEEKEND

Weidman area folks really felt that cold snap Friday and Saturday, with many homes in this area reporting frozen water pipes. Also cars frozen up.

Temperatures dropped to 15 degrees below zero Friday night with a northwest wind that was estimated to bring the chill factor to 40 below zero.

Many homes on gas-furnace heat had trouble especially Saturday, and some blamed the gas company, as not having sufficient loads of gas in the lines.

Monday morning we talked with the office manager of Michigan Consolidated Gas Company, and incidentally related our personal troubles Saturday, when all day we ran our gas furnace at 90 on the thermostat and couldn't get our room temperatures up over 70 degrees.

The gas company man said the office had had over 200 calls from gas users Friday and Saturday, complaining they couldn't get their homes heated.

"If you will check your furnace filters," he said, "just before or during such a cold wave as we had, and if the filters are filled with dust and accumulation, either clean them or leave them out of the furnace until the cold spell is over, you'll get plenty of

heat from gas furnaces.

"Clogged filters definitely will stop heat flow on any furnace, whether gas or oil or what," he went on. "Re-usable filters can be swept clean and returned to the furnace. Disposable filters should be replaced.

"How often? We wouldn't give a definite time-limit. It depends on how much dust, lint, dog-and-cat hair is dragged down into the furnace and against the filters.

"But if you can't get heat from your gas furnace, just check the filters. That's all we say about it. There is plenty of gas in our mains, and there was no overload during Friday and Saturday's cold snap. But private installations of gas furnaces should be checked often during winter months, and they must be kept clean if the honest heat from the gas furnace is to flow up into your rooms."

(Editor's Note: We called Bill Brown immediately, to come and put new filters in our furnace. We sure were cold Saturday.)

Marshall's Garage in Weidman was swamped with calls Saturday and Sunday, to get cars moving that were frozen up, wouldn't start, and the usual multitudinous troubles besetting the motorist in weather like last weekend's.






