WHERE THE BULLDOZER GOES. TUMBLEWEEDS SPRING UP

Last week we discovered a solid line of giant tumbleweeds on both sides of "Roe Court" on Plat No. 3, Lake of the Hills (not yet approved), and we went over into our west fields, where the road is, and started pulling the monsters and stuffing them into the back of our old station wagon. Our first thought was to take them home and deposit them on our burning-pile near the lake.

On attempting to pull them out of the 'wagon, however, we discovered they shed seeds copiously, and we shied away from the thought of dragging them down to our burning pile (You can't

take a car in there.)
So we thought of the Nottawa Dump, though we were ashamed of ourselves for taking anything so pesky as tumbleweeds to an-

other locality. So we called up Ernie Schmidt, Nottawa Township Supervisor, and he said, Sure, take em over and dump em, we don't care.

So we took our first load over to the Nottawa dump, which is bulldozed each week--and guess what? Yup, there were tumbleweeds growing over the fields where the bulldozer had worked.


So we kept on pulling 'em out of Roe Court and took over four car loads (we still have one or

two to go). Sunday we were at Coldwater Lake, and Lo, the tumbleweeds, where any bulldozing had been done. Along the new road at the County Park. In developing sections around the lake, at least on the south side, which
