(From that paper's 'Voice of

the People'):

"Our local election will soon be here, we are asked to vote for millions of dollars for schools and salaries, playgrounds, plus \$75,000 to remodel a stadium.

"I think it's about time we had some officials who know a little about business. The city just had to buy the State Street school for \$75,000, which was already condemned; almost \$10,000 repairs, then \$34,000 to tear it down, a rather expensive lot for us taxpayers.

"Raises every year for school employees. I haven't seen a teacher or any school official worth \$50 a day for several hours, for 180 days of the year.

"And all these fancy school buildings: more halls and playrooms...Fancy buildings don't make better scholars."

"We have too many people telling us what to do with our little money. I say let's cut out twothirds of the officials we are supporting and maybe we could buy a little extra food once in a while or buy a dress or suit once

in a while, or a pair of shoes.

"(Signed) A taxpayer, but not

for long."

rate of speed, his car leaving the road 145 feet south of the

point of impact.

Before striking the fire truck the driver brought the car up out of a ditch and then hit the fire truck. The impact was great enough to raise the back end of the fire truck, which was loaded with 500 gallons of water in addition to its regular equipment. The police report also showed the car had defective brakes.

Just prior to the crash, according to the Farwell News, another driver, Carl Heim of Wheeler, said he had slowed down as he came upon the fire scene and was driving at about 10 miles an hour when the Abbott car passed him on the right side of the road at high speed.
