SGT. RALPH CROWLEY'S FAMILY RECEIVE POSTHUMOUS AWARDS

Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Crowley of rural Remus have received posthumous medals earned by their son, Sgt. Ralph Crowley who was killed in action in Vietnam last May.

The family received his Silver Star medal, the nation's third highest award for heroism in combat; the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart, the Good Conduct Medal, the National Defense Service Medal, the Vietnam campaign ribbon, the Combat Infantryman's Badge, and the Expert Weapons Qualifications Badge.

Sgt. Crowley was killed May 27 in Vietnam while leading a patrol in an attack against an enemy position. He was mortally wounded as he assaulted a second North Vietnamese army fighting bunker, after destroying one bunker and killing two enemy soldiers.

Sgt. Crowley graduated from the Mecost-Remus High School in 1967.
