SMALL TOWNS LOSING THEIR IDENTITIES?

We have heard a number of people to the west of us complaining, "Barryton is losing its identity since it lost its high school and its newspaper." And, "Barryton merchants wish they had a newspaper over there like the Weidman Messenger."

We have watched the Barryton situation over a period of 40 years, and here is what we have come to conclude:

Barryton merchants, like other small-town merchants, want a "local newspaper," devoted to the immediate area and boosting the town of Barryton, but they also want to spend their adver-tising money on "shoppers guides" and other "boxholder" sheets, not with the local newspaper.
We have seen the Barryton mer-

chants place their advertisements not in the local newspaper, but in "big circulation" free-delivery publications. We have watched the decline and death of the Barryton local newspaper.

Barryton has learned that you can't have both, a true local newspaper and advertising money going to Big Rapids, St. Louis, Mt. Pleasant, anywhere but in the local Barryton paper.

It is the same in every small town today. Merchants want "complete coverage", i.e., the "boxholder" media for their ads. The local newspaper operates on a paid-circulation basis and cannot come up with "complete coverage".

Local advertisers refuse to see that the true local newspaper is read for its every word on every page, and then "passed along" to relatives, friends and neigh-bors. (The Messenger claims 1,500 families as readers every week, one-third paid subscribers.)

Advertisers brush off this readability of the true local newspaper, and spend their money on "full coverage" boxholder advertising media.

When Connie Skinner is gone the Weidman Messenger will go also, and forever. The Messenger would not support a family on its net income.

MARK DENSLOW AND SMALL COMPANION RESCUED FROM FALL IN CHIPPEWA RIVER

Mark Denslow, son of Mr. and Mrs. Berl Denslow of West Airline Road, and Penny Corwin of Mt. Pleasant were rescued by two Barryton men after they had fallen into the Chippewa River.

Mark is four and a half years old, Penny Corwin three. Penny is the daughter of State Police Trooper and Mrs. George Corwin of Mt. Pleasant.

The children apparently fell into the river about 2 o'clock in the afternoon, and Edward Schade of Barryton pulled Mark out. Gerald Sherman and Terry Wixon of Barryton rescued the small girl from the water.

Mr. Sherman first applied cardiac massage to revive the little girl, when Mrs. Gladys Hyatt of rural Mt. Pleasant came along and gave her mouth-to-mouth

resuscitation.

Police have estimated that she was in the river from five to 10 minutes before she was rescued. She was taken to CMC Hospital where she was treated for exposure and pneumonia.

Mrs. Hyatt is a registered nurse. The children apparently had been playing near a steep bank on the river, and fell in.

They were lucky to be rescued, and lucky that Mrs. Hyatt came along.
