CAN SPRING BE FAR BEHIND?--YES!

For the first time since it was created, Lake of the Hills stayed frozen over into the middle of April. Migrating birds have come and for the first time have found no place to rest, in this area.

The Canada geese went over in beautiful formations during the past two weeks, heading northwest from Mt. Pleasant, apparently intending to rest on our area lakes, as they do each spring. They had to keep on going,

They had to keep on going, though. There was no open water except on running streams, and we missed the pleasure of the big birds' company this spring.

Usually we have swans, too, stopping off for a couple of weeks or so to rest here. They come early, usually, when cold March winds are still blowing but the ice is gone from lakes.

We may possibly get some late arrivals in the swan and geese families, but we doubt it. The lovely big birds head for Arctic regions early.

Last weekend our ground was still frozen, here at Weidman. We did see one lone crocus attempting to get up and around in our garden.

That's the extent of Spring so far, here in Central Michigan.

We have a copy of the 1970 fishing regulations for Michigan, and we see where a man 65 or older may get a fishing license for himself and his wife for 50 cents. That includes permission to take all kinds of fish, including trout and salmon.

That's a good break, for there are many oldsters here who like to fish.

We send around 40 copies of the Messenger to the city of Mt. Pleasant each week, but we'd bet that half that town reads this paper.

From everywhere over there, Ye Ed hears of people she never knew reading the Weidman paper. And also we hear from many people we do know, over in that

city.

SPEARING FOR SUCKERS AND CARP ALLOWED HERE

Howard Rowe, Conservation officer for the Department of Natural Resources, announced last week that regulations have been changed for the Weidman area in relation to spearing of rough fish.

Day and night spearing of suckers and carp are now allowed on all non-trout streams around here, according to Mr. Rowe.

The spearing season is set for the remainder of April and for May.

Non-trout streams include the Chippewa River up to Rolland Road, or to the first bridge above the Lake Isabella dam;

The Coldwater River in its en-

tirety;
Walker Creek from the northwest boundaries of Lake of the Hills to the Lake Windoga dam.

In all of these streams, and in the Weidman Mill Pond and in Lake of the Hills and other nontrout lakes around here, suckers and carp may be speared day or night during the rest of this month and through May.

Spearing of pike is closed except in January and February. Hook and line fishing for this species opens its season May 15.

So come on, sportsmen and boys wanting fun, and help clear the Weidman Mill Pond of some of its bigger carp, while the Pond is drained and the huge rough fish like to wallow in mud and shallow waters.




