

CENTRAL MICHIGAN RIGHT TO LIFE HOLDS MEETING JUNE 21

The Central Michigan Right to Life, local chapter of Michigan Citizens for Life, will hold a meeting this Thursday, June 21, at 8 p.m.

All interested persons in the area of central Michigan, including St. Louis, Mt. Pleasant, Weidman, Remus, Barryton, and Mecosta (and Others) are cordially invited and urge to attend.

Beginning in July, regular meetings will be held monthly on the second Thursday in the Court House at Mt. Pleasant, at 8 p. m.

Mrs. Thelma Simmer is leading the activities in this immediate area, and she urges all interested in preventing huge sums of money from the OEO to be transferred to HEW, where it will be used for "family planning", contraceptives, and other means of getting rid of unborn babies.

Help and support of all interested perons is urgently needed, Mrs. Simmer said in an interview, and she urged all those interested in combatting the trend of abortions-on-demand and use of tax monies for abortions, abortion counseling, and so-called "family planning".

The Michigan Citizens for Life was the host organization for the fourth annual National Right to Life convention held in the Sheraton-Cadillac Hotel in Detroit June 8, 9 and 10.

An overflow crowd of more than 1,500 people attended. There were 46 States represented, and a delegation from Australia.

The convention brought into sharp focus the great need for increasing our respect, protection and love for all human life at any stage of development, and the urgent necessity of obtaining a constitutional amend-

ment to protect for all time the right of every human being to the gift of life.

Mrs. Simmer pointed out that recent appellate court decisions have indicated that responsibilities for the continuing existence of the Office of Economic Opportunity (which has millions of dollars) will come about only if there is massive positive congressional action. This is most unlikely, Mrs. Simmer said.

The programs and funds of the Office of Economic Opportunity will be transferred to the Health, Education and Welfare Family Planning division before June 30

of this year.

She said that positive action is needed to get in the following specific conditions to any family-planning grants that may be transferred.

Before tax-originated money can be distributed to family planning organizations, the following conditions should be met:

 No OEO funds may be used to finance an abortion of any kind under any circumstances.

2. Abortion counseling: The family planning agency must seek both volunteer and paid professional personnal from Birthright or a smiliar group.

The husband and/or father must consent to the abortion and the immediate family, if any, must be consulted. The recipient of the abortion counseling must state in writing that she knows the possible physical and psychological consequences of abor tion. No person counseling abortion, or any member of their immediate family, may stand to gain financially from the abortion. No OEO money may be used to fund any family planning agency which uses mass media advertising. Family planning agency outreach workers must be limited to responding to solicitation.
