Editor's Column

DON'T FORGET TO VOTE NEXT MONDAY, JUNE 11

Don't forget to go and vote in the Chippewa Hills school election next Monday, June 11. We have had no word from school officials, but the polls usually are open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Taxpayers in Isabella County, in the Chippewa Hills District, will vote at the Weidman school.

Questions of great importance to the taxpaying public include the proposition for a super swimming pool in the high school, which proposition we snowed under in recent years. Also a proposal for a bonding

Also a proposal for a bonding debt of four and two-tenths million dollars, to build the swimming pool, build another new school, a "middle" school, and renovate and repair existing buildings in Weidman, Barryton, Remus and Mecosta.


We are already in debt for two and eight-tenths million dollars for the new high school. With a relatively high interest rate on the bonds sold, we will be paying about double that amount, or nearly six million dollars by the time the debt is paid off. Interest on amounts in millions doubles the debt in 28 years.

We believe that good schools can be maintained and operated without fancy new buildings; we need buildings adequate for the learning process of students, but we don't need ornate one-story buildings which have been a rich harvest for school-building architects. (Our kids can no longer walk up even one flight of stairs; all new school buildings are of necessity ground-flooronly designs.) (Heating and cooling costs are thus doubled, or thereabouts, but the architects are happy.)


Land owners (taxpayers) will be facing uncounted numbers of voters with no financial stakes in the outcome of next Monday's election in the Chippewa Hills District.

It is important to every land owner (taxpayer) resident of the school district to get out and vote next Tuesday, June 11.

GEORGE MERRIHEW George Merrihew died Sunday, June 3, at Kelsey Mem-orial Hospital in Lakeview, following a stroke. He was 88 years old.

He was born Dec. 26, 1884, in St. Johns, and came to Sherman Township with his parents, Elmer and Victoria Merribew, when he was four years old. He lived his entire life on the Merrihew farm which his parents homesteaded, retiring only a few years ago.

THE BEGINNING OF A VILLAGE

In 1894 John S. Weidman, having put up one sawmill and starting in business, built his family a home; the big house now owned by the Gary Spragues.

Lumbermen built their homes well, and with good, seasoned lumber, as the Sprague home will attest. Today it is hard to believe that Gary and Lucinda Sprague's lovely home was built in 1894. John S. Weidman's timbers have held.

In 1894-95, from the Weidman house down to the river was a solid buildup of horse barns, a blacksmith shop for Weidman's Photo loaned the Messenger by Grace (Woolworth) Watson

horses to be serviced with shoes, a men's shanty and cook house (though Mrs. Weidman cooked for the mill hands during the first year of the family's business here here).

There was a nation-wide financial panic in 1893, and by 1894 John S. Weidman's lumber business here felt the squeeze.

There was a lot of timber here to be sawed into lumber, but nobody was buying lumber during those two years, 1893-94.

An old letter from J. Stanley Weidman (John S. Weidman, Jr.) to Leon McArthur mentions, in one paragraph, "I enjoyed reading that article about my father's statement about McKinley versus Bryan, and it was the election of McKinley (as President) that changed the economic picture for the Weidmans, and the entire lumber industry, most favorably."

Charles W. Pierce came here with Mr. Weidman, and was his foreman and advisor in the matter of acquiring lands and laying out a village.

For 16 years he had charge of all woods operations. His job was to see that the big sawmill here always had in its pond and yards an adequate stock of logs. He also helped Mr. Weidman lay out a village plat, in 1894, and that plat stands valid today.

His brother, Walter, and Walter's wife did the work at the

cook shanty and bunk house.

Mr. Weidman and Mr. Pierce planned the village streets so that the business section would run east and west, but that was counter-decided early in the growth of the town. The business section grew up on one street, north and south (Third Street, or Woodruff Road as we now know it).

The first business building was that of Mills & Scott Brothers, who made a deal with Mr. Weidman to put up a store with Mr. Weidman furnishing the lumber. No stipulations of size were discussed, and the huge building still stands; and while Mr. Weidman furnished more lumber than he'd planned on, he cheerfully furnished it.

The Mills & Scott Bros. store building was put up in 1894. That same year John A. Damon came here from Hubbardston and built a store on the corner of Third and Main Streets. The wood building burned in the fire of 1897, with stock of general merchandise (dry goods, groceries, some hardware) and drugs, was totally destroyed in the fire. Mr. Damon immediately purchased new stock and moved his store to a small building about where the Masonic Hall now stands.

By the middle of August (the year of the fire), Mr. Damon had completed the building of a brick store-building, later to be occupied by the Middlesworth family and business, and now by the Jim Clarks.

Mr. Damon was elected county treasurer in 1906 and moved to Mt. Pleasant, and thereafter was active in politics the rest of his life.
