ECOLOGY AND THE CHIPPEWA HILLS SCHOOL

Ivan Allen was the only member of the Chippewa Hills Schools Board of Education to vote against giving outright a 40-acre tract of land owned by the school district to the Chippewa Hills Industrial Development Corporation, at last week's Board of Education meeting.

His main objection was on the ecological side: What use to plan and build a multi-million-dollar school building and then put a factory practically on its door-

The setting for the new high school is rural and partly wooded. The Industrial Development Corporation wants a factory on the site, with a factory building and the endless parking spaces for factory workers.

The Board handed over a 99year lease to the Industrial Development Corporation, at no cost to the Corporation. It just gave the Corporation the land it had bought with tax monies (bonds) of the district.

As Mr. Allen said, Maybe the Board had a legal right to this action (which we personally doubt), but did it have a moral right to spoil the ecology of the ultra-ultra new high school's rural setting?

The whole transaction gives us the personal creeps.

It gives us to believe that we do not have a big-big consolidated school, we have a big-big bureaucracy, riddled with internal politics and motivated by ultra- SAW MANY DECISIONS MADE curricular opportunism.

We have a huge organization loaded with brass at the top drawing fancy salaries (the Board gave James P. Jorgensen a \$1,000 per year raise, which we understand sets his salary at \$20,000) and the lesser personnel also drawing the biggest money of their lives.

Out of tax collections.

Well might we pause here and ask ourselves, "What have we wrought?"

Incidentally, there was only one "interested citizen" at the last Board meeting. The public is in-

ATTEND FIRST SCHOOL BOARD MEETING AS VOTING MEMBERS' Dr. E. H. Kowaleski of Remus and Ivan Allen of Weidman attended their first meeting of the Chippewa Hills School Board last week as voting members. Mr. Allen was elected to the Board in the recent election. Dr. Kowaleski, who has been President of the Board since the consolidation, had heretofore never been able to vote on any issue, as the President may vote only to break a tie; at least by past rules. Now both have votes on the Board. Dr. Kowaleski is a well known physician of the area. Mr. Allen is a lumber dealer, builder, and developer of Lake of the Hills.

SHERMAN TOWNSHIP HAS ZONING ORDINANCE READY FOR PUBLIC DISCUSSION

The Zoning Committee appoint ed by the Sherman Township Board has a Zoning Ordinance put together tentatively, which will be reviewed and discussed at a public meeting Aug. 12.

The ordinance is not entirely coherent, and the public will be interested in several portions of it that need to be clarified, at least at this point.

The public of Sherman Township is urged to attend the meeting August 12.

BOARD MEETING LAST WEEK

Here are some facts and figures gleaned from the July 13 meeting of the Chippewa Hills Board of Education:

A hundred and eight teachers are hired for the coming year, six more than last year. This increase in teacher numbers is explained by increased elementary-age children in the schools and also increased activity in vocational education, a sorely needed adjunct to our high school curriculum.

Expansion of elementaryschool pupil numbers is mainly in this area, and in Mecosta

County (Canadian Lakes development).

The school district gained approximately eight million dollars in valuation, and the two mills over the 10 mills the school had before will make a heck of a difference in dollars to the school.

The Board approved an operating budget for the coming year of two million dollars.

State Aid will supply \$858, 819, property taxes will give up \$833,053, with \$61,177 in delinquent taxes and interest, which the school gets whether the taxes are paid or not.

If the "grandfather clause" (not receiving less from the State than heretofore) stands, it will give the Chippewa Hills Schools a surplus of \$75,000 at the end of the year, according to the budget. If it is withdrawn, the school's budget will be balanced.

(And that's on 12 mills--what became of the necessity, the absolutely dire necessity, of 15 mills?)

Teachers' salaries average approximately \$10,000 per teacher per year. This is with \$60,766 granted in fringe benefits, averaging approximately \$600 per
