WEIDMAN LADIES

ENJOYED EUROPEAN TRIP

Mrs. Virginia Herman, Mrs. Margaret Gingrich and two teenaged girls, Miss Melanie Mc-Clain and Miss Becky VanderSys, thoroughly enjoyed their summer trip to Europe--except in Czechoslovakia.

They left Detroit Metro Airport and flew non-stop to Amsterdam, Holland, July 16, and visited the world's largest flower market at Almsmeer. Mrs. Herman took 10 rolls of colored slide pictures. All had cameras, and all took colored slides.

In Frankfurt, Germany, Mrs. Herman called the Ross Momanys, who met them, bringing the Gary McArthurs, and they all went to a small distinctive pastry and refreshment shop for an evening of listening to a fivepiece string orchestra playing the old-time waltzes and songs.

"It was a formal sort of place, and yet informal," Mrs. Herman said in an interview. "I really can't explain it. But it was lovely."

In Frankfurt they did some shopping, particularly in stainless steelware, for which the city is world-known.

Nuremburg is the toy capital of the world, and Mrs. Herman and Mrs. Gingrich bought toys for their grandchildren, Christmas trimmings such as we do not have here, and some wood carvings. Some parts of the city of Nuremburg date back to the 12th Century.

All of Europe they saw appeared prosperous, excessively neat and clean, they said, except Prague, in Czechoslovakia which seemed dull and lifeless and quite drab. The heartbreak of the Czech people appears to manifest itself in neglect of their once-beautiful homes and streets.

The party spent three days in Prague, and were saddened by the change in people, from those they had seen in other European countries.

They were detained at a bank in Prague when Mrs. Herman attempted to cash a traveler's check, for an hour and a half. Bank officials took their travel visas and passports, much to the dismay of the party. They finally got back their papers, and moved on to Austria and Switzerland.

These are beautiful, they report, the highlights of any trip to Europe. Their favorite place to shop was in Salzburg, Austria, where they bought pottery, table linens, candles and jewelry of unusual designs. "It's a dream of a place to shop in," they reported.

They spent three days at Wildhaus, in Switzerland, at a winter resort area. They took a mountain hike, with a guide, and said it was cold, very cold.

In the small town of Buchs they bought some watches for their families. They spent one night

in Berne, one in Geneva, visit-ed the Red Cross, and headquar-ters of the World Council of Churches.

"It's the international city of the world," Mrs. Herman said, of Geneva.

At Dijon, in the south of France, they visited a community of Protestant Brothers, at Tiaze. The Brotherhood originally was formed to help refugees during World War II. After the war the group worked on, establishing their order in places all over the world. It is not a preaching order, but a working order. The Weidman party attended evening worship service at their church, a curious ampitheatre structure with beautiful stained glass windows and a wonderful pipe organ.

They spent four days in Paris, visiting all points of historical interest. They visited Versailles, spent a day shopping, and attended the Folies Bergiere. They attended theatres in each country they visited.

They report that Normandy, in the north of France, is beautiful country, and this is where the United States troops landed in World War II.

They visited Omaha Beach, where 9,386 American soldiers are buried, with 307 unknown. The cemetery is beautifully appointed and maintained, they

said, by the United States.
At LeHavre they boarded a boat to cross the English Channel, a seven and a half hour trip. "There was a fabulous

smorgasborg," they remarked.
In London they visited John
Wesley's Chapel, the first church in England in which he preached.

"We were glad to get to England, where we could read the signs again," they said, though they enjoyed all countries and all their people except Czechoslovakia, and they had no contact with the real Czechs.

They attended Sunday church services at Westminster Abbey, and visited the Tower of London.

On their last day in London, Mrs. Herman spent the time with a woman with whom she had corresponded for 20 years without having met her before. Virginia spent a wonderful day with her warm friends, Peter and Edna Raeburn.

Germany was important, all felt. England was very important, they believe. ""I felt all this was a part of my history, too," Mrs. Herman said.

They also met a community group of Protestant Sisters, a group who were 18 years old in World War II and huddled together during bombing raids. They swore that if they lived, they would devote their lives to making the world a better place to live. Fifteen kept their vows, and now are a nucleus of a worldwide organization of women doing charitable work. All in all, it was a memorable tour for the Weidman ladies.

The West Michigan Conference of the Methodist Church made all arrangements abroad for the group.
