## Weidman Mill Changes Hands

John Mitrzyk of Standish and Carl Dickinson took over management of Holmes Milling Co. Tuesday morning as partners, after a deal was closed Monday by the board of directors and the new operators.

The deal involved only the property on which the mill sits, on the west banks of the river.

The new partners will continue with selling wholesale grain and flour of various kinds. They will buy grain from local farmers, they said Tuesday, and expect to do grinding for farm feeds, Mr. Dickinson said this week.

Mr. Mitrzyk has four other elevators, at Standish, Gaylord, Pine River, and Turner, besides the Weidman mill.

Weidman folks wish the new partners the best of luck and good business. Farmers' grinding and grain-selling business brings their families to town, and Weidman feels fortunate in having this service reopened to local area farmers.

## Nottawa Votes Recreation by Special Board's Powers

Voters of Nottawa Township turned out in strong numbers at the special election Monday evening and voted, 100 to 3, to empower the Township Board to appropriate money for recreational purposes, at its discretion.

Funds will come from the township's intangible and sales tax accumulations, and can be used only for the benefit of the public in recreational projects.

An acting committee was planned at Monday night's meeting, with two Township Board members, Julius Bierschback and Virgil Smith, with plans for two members of the Beal City Business Association, two from the Beal City Public School, and one member-at-large, these last yet to be chosen.

Immediately on the agenda is a project for foot ball playing lights at the Beal City High School athletic field. The Township Board is now in the process of calling for bids on the installation.

General feeling was that this was a major step forward for the township, as there is now a definite recreational organization within the township's legal organization to carry forward improvement of facilities for any place in Nottawa Township they may approve. This includes the east half of the village of Weidman, in which Mitchell Memorial Park is situated.

## New Parking Lot For Weidman Shoppers

A new and adequate parking lot was being completed this week in Weidman, on several lots owned by Miles Drallette and offered by him for use in this purpose.

The Weidman Business Association took on this project, and the first of the week bulldozing was done by Cloyce Miller, followed by leveling work and general cleanup by Orval Branson, and hauling of gravel to complete it.

Weidman's business street has been a problem to motorists for the past several years, as cars grew longer and angle parking took up more of the driving space of the street.

Ultimate project is to get the street widened, shearing off about three feet of unneeded sidewalk on one or both sides and re-installing gutters.

Meantime, the new parking lot will relieve weekend congestion on the main street, giving plenty of space for farmers' trucks, and affording handy space for anyone's car while one shops and does business in Weidman.

## A GIRL FOR THE DANNY WERNETTES

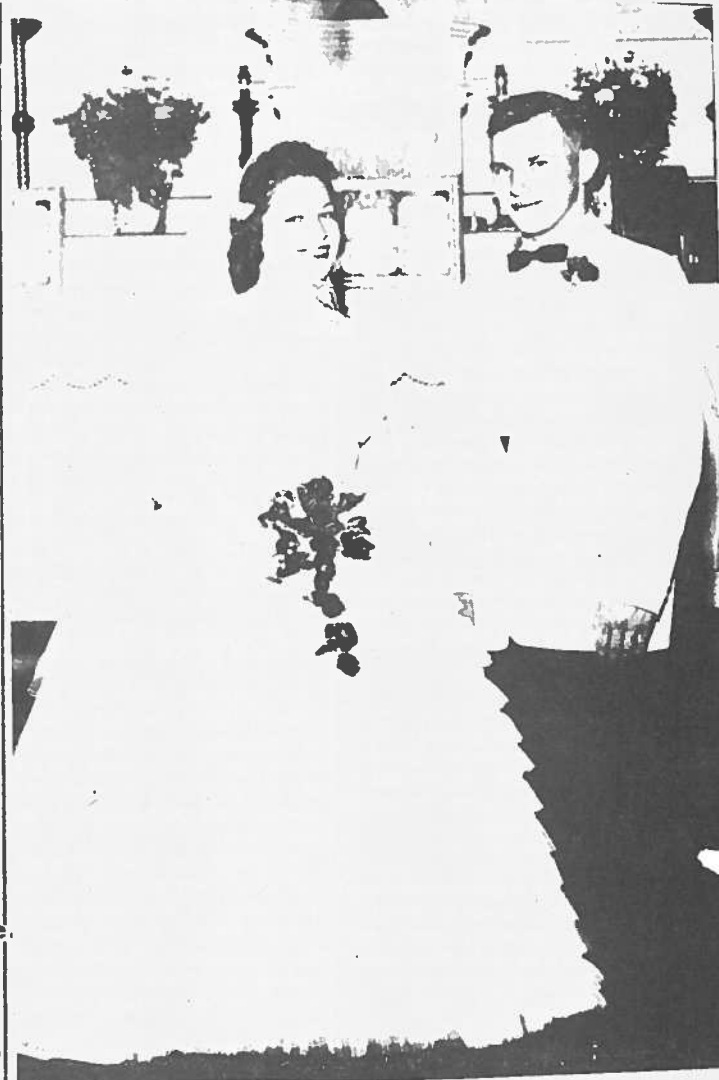
Mr. and Mrs. Danny Wernette are the proud parents of a baby daughter born Wednesday, Sept. 25, at Community Hospital.

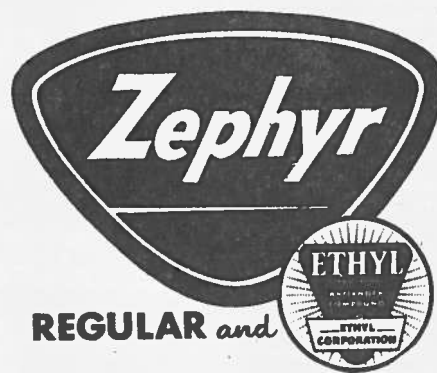

Larry Myers, supervisor, reports that 14 herds in Isabella County, with 357 cows, averaged 27.9 lbs. of fat per cow and 775 lbs. of milk for August. Five herds in Clare County, with 252 cows, averaged 34.1 lbs. of butterfat and 899 lbs. of milk.

For the 11-month period, Robert Recker led the group, with his 20 cows producing 474 lbs. of fat. Maurice John and Son, with 12 cows, had a 450 lb. fat average.

Next came Howard Penrose with 74 cows at 431 lbs. of fat, followed by Lewis Becker with 22 cows at 424 lbs. of fat. Charles Purtil was next, with 15 cows at 417 lbs., followed by Joe Stevens and Son at 414.

There is still an opportunity for one or two more dairymen to join this association. The County Extension Office may be contacted, or Milton Brown, Mt. Pleasant Route 4.

**NO. 2 AUGUST REPORT**

The 14 herds consisting of 329 cows averaged 802 lbs. of milk and 28 lbs. of butterfat for the month. The high herd for the month was owned by Robert Clark with 19 cows averaging 44.3 lbs. of fat. Next high was Arnold House with 19 cows making 39.6 lbs. of fat, followed by Norman Gross with 16 cows at 33.9, William Block and Sons, 24 cows at 32.8 lbs. and Cotter and Bogan 30 cows at 30.4 lbs.

Unusually high records were made in August when Robert Clark had two cows making 107 and 102 lbs. of fat respectively. It is rare when individual cows on twice a day milking hit 100 lbs. of butterfat in a month. Arnold House had a cow making 89 lbs. of fat and three others with 69 lbs. or more.
