Weidman Roads To Remain Bad

Not much hope of road betterment around Weidman was given by Ernest Bruce Tuesday morning in a telephone conversation with this newspaper.

The ten-mile stretch to US-27 straight east out of town is scheduled for "graveling this fall, but we've been slowed down," Bruce said. The last mile toward 27 was closed at times this week as rains made going impossible for cars.

The county is widening culverts and grading down small hills on this road and also on the road south to M-20 through Beal City. A major cut was made in the rise at the Beal City corners.

Bruce had no encouragement for drivers on any road out of Weidman so far as accessibility in the ordinary sense was concerned this fall.

The north road across the mill pond is on the agenda, he said, but there may be some difficulty there, according to him.

"We want to get that piece graded this fall if we can," he said Tuesday. "We'll have to take soundings and borings to determine what has to be done there. We had a state man up last week looking it over."
