His mother, Mrs. Sarah Wiley, who has lived with him in their trailer-house home beside the station, plans to go to Grand Rapids to visit her sister.

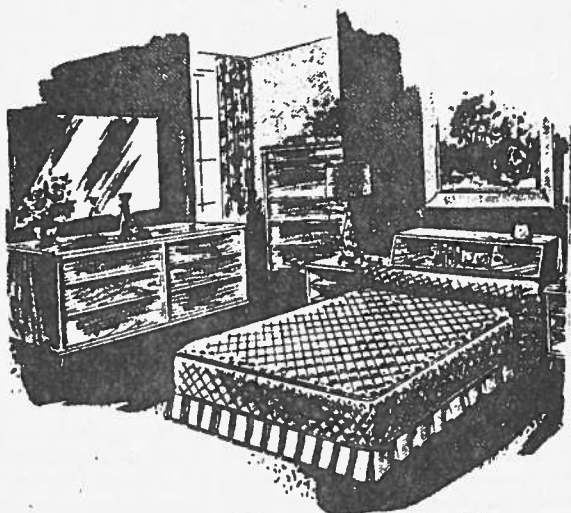
