History of Early **American Indians** in Michigan

By J. Foster Otto Long ago, and about the time Columbus landed on the shores of America, there lived a fierce tribe of Indians in what is now the Saginaw area This tribe may have extended north, on to Pinconning or fur-

ther, along the east shore of Saginaw Bay and on up the Thumb district, southwards to Flint, east to Port Huron and

westward to present Midland. They were a loosely organized group, and like all North American Indians they depend-ed on game and fish of the area. No doubt they cultivated some corn, squash, melons, radishes and many other vege tables which present people grow in their gardens.

This information is what I have recalled from hearing old Indians of 60 years ago relate at their visits at my home near Isabella Crossing and at Weidman.

Isabella Crossing is two miles north from the Michigan State Police post at Mt. Pleasant and one mile east of US-27.

These Indians (who told me of the ancient times), men and women, were up in years, perhaps over 60 years of age, my grandmother being then close to 82--a pagan, accord-ing to present-day standards of reckoning. This tribe was known as Sau-

GEEK (plural) or Sau-GEE (singular). Present Saginaw is the name derived from the above. Saugeek were cannabalistic by nature in regard to captured prisoners from other tribes, their neighbors the present Chip pewas, Ottawas and Pottowatto-mies of the Lower Peninsula. It was not safe for the above mentioned tribes to go hunting alone. They were in danger of being captured by Saugeek, who hunted in groups. There was many an Indian hunter who never came back home; captured and taken to the Saugee camp amid a merry-making of savages bent on eating the flesh of such a choice specimen of brave enemy. This eating of the prisoner was thought of as inheriting the bravery and fighting qualities of the prisoner.

As time went on, the out-raged Chippewas, Ottawas and Pottowattomies sat in great council. Topic was ways and means how to cope with the Saugeek; to expel by com-bined forces of the three tribes to exterminate if possible.

The "Three Fires, " as the Chippewas, Ottawas and Pottowattomies were called, de-cided to call for help from the Chippewas of the Upper Peninsula and the fierce Dakotas, who were then living in what is now the western end

of the Upper Peninsula. After many council meetings

of the two tribes of northern Indians, a plan was decided on; also the date was agreed

to. I have heard from James Walker, now dead, and James Johnson of Kawkawlin, also now dead, relate the same story, word for word. Here is the story as best I can recall:

The combined forces of the defenders (Chippewas, Otta-was, Pottowattomies), moved across the present State of Michigan west to east, con-verging as they neared the Saugee territory (now Saginaw). As the defenders neared their

object of attack, warriors were so close together as they crept toward the doomed Saugeek that the distance between the defenders was narrow enough to thwart the enemy in es-caping through their lines. Early morning was the zero hour to exterminate the dread ed enemy.

Attack took place to the advantage of the Allies. Fighting was fierce. Many of the Allies fell under the fierce resistance of the Saugeek. Some of the Saugeek escaped by canoes down Saginaw River, and on northward on Saginaw Bay. Some paddled to an island on the river. The Allies could not pursue either group, for they did not have canoes, and the water was cold, far too cold, to try swimming across to the island, as it was late moon of deer hunting (November).

Luck was with the Allies as the weather turned real cold --ice formed over Saginaw River to permit the Allies to cross in large numbers to attack the enemy entrenched on the island.

The defenders were success ful in killing off all those who took refuge on this island.

Many years after the white men came to the Saginaw region, some paddled on the island, battleground of many years. As the people moved over the island they found human skulls in large numbers and wondered why the grisly find was confined to an island.

The Allies did not bother to bury the enemy dead but left them as carrion on the island. The Allies were busy trailing

the enemy who escaped by canoes going northward; many miles of traveling along Sagi-naw Bay they (Allies) came across empty cances beached near what is now Tawas City. Saugeek left a clear trail lead ing northward to what is now

the Au Sable River. My brother Peter, now dead, told me this of the last stand of the Saugeek of Michigan. ''T was on a high bank of the Au Sable River the enemy

took refuge. The riverside could be defended very easily because it was very steep and hard to climb. The loose sand

gave way under foot. The other or south side was also high, and could be de-fended without being exposed to much of bow and arrow at-tack. The fight lasted many hours and days.

Though outnumbered, the remaining Saugeek fought very bravely in spite of large num-bers of the Allies coming on. I may describe at this time a forerunner of the massacre at Little Big Horn of Custer

and his men. The Dakota chieftains view-

ed the tenacity of the trapped Saugeek in their defense of their lives, women, old men and children. He asked the other chieftains if an armistice could be arranged between the Saugeek and the other In-dian Allies. It appears a truce was declared, whereby the Da-kotas took the Saugeek as prisoners of war. A promise was made that no prisoner of war was to be tortured or burned at the stake, but to be safely conducted to faraway Dakota territory, many days' journey to the setting sun, now the states of North and South Da-

To this day is to be found a tribe of Indians who speak a eculiar dialect unlike the Da kotas who live around them.

This tribe tells of their fore fathers who came many days' journey from the land of rising sun and land of many large lakes.

Thus I come to an end of my story of once fierce tribe of Saugeek, who met equally fierce and warlike tribe and lost. There be other versions of this fight and can be added. A legend gets its source from some facts and truths.
