Weidman School Enters Teachers' Aide Program

The Weidman School will go on a teacher's aide program this fall for the first time. The program has been in effect in the Bay City schools for about seven years.

The decision to hire a non-professional in the classroom was made after the local Board of Education reversed a decision of last March to put the first grade pupils on half-day schedules for the coming year. At its meeting last Thursday evening, the Weidman board decided the first-graders will attend full-day sessions.

To make this possible, the position of a teacher's aide has been created for the fifth grade room, where there are 45 students this year. The regular fifth-grade teacher and the teacher's aide will work together in the room during all school days.

The school administration and representatives from the field services department of Central Michigan College will be screening candidates for the job probably by the end of next week. Rex Wood, superintendent, said he will receive the names of any interested and list them for screening by the local school heads and the College men.

A teacher's aide does non-professional work such as collecting money from the students, helping individuals, and reading back spelling words, and so on, to release the teacher for her own work.

Qualifications for the job of teacher's aide are the same as those which make any good teacher, Mr. Wood said, with the exception of the college credits demanded of professional teachers. A high school diploma will be expected. Mr. Wood said they expect to hire a local person for the job.

Mrs. Emory Townsend, wife of the new ag teacher, will be on teacher's aide status, in the library, Mr. Wood said.
