FRED L. KENT, ON THE STEPS OF SHERMAN TOWNSHIP

HALL, 1932 WE OBSERVE SHERMAN'S CENTENNIAL WITH FRED KENT'S HISTORY AND WIT

This is Centennial Year for the Township of Sherman in the factor of observing the first settling of the area. Organization of the Township is not the object of this Centennial observation, but the hardy pioneer families who were the first to build log houses and take up farms in Sherman. We feel that these people, and this township, can best be repre-sented by the life and writings of Fred Kent, himself one of the older residents, who wrote the Horr news for a Mt. Pleasant pa per and later for the Weidman Messenger when Rolla Roe ran the paper.

Fred Kent is remembered by many of us, and his healthy phil-osophy and his dry humor were two of his characteristics which endeared him to this locality. With this issue the Messenger

begins a prelude to Fred Kent's History of Sherman Township. We feel we should like to pre-

sent Fred Kent first, and we are indebted to Rozena Hogan for the history and Mr. Kent's scrap book, both of which are priceless Rozena is a granddaughter of Fred Kent. Rosie says there are many other grandchildren. Fred Kent's children now living are two sons, Kenneth and Arthur Kent, and two daughters, Belle Archey and Millie Dent, all of Grand Rapids.

Here is a sample of Fred Kent's observation of his times, and of his humor:

"Live every day of your life as though it were your last. Some day you'll be right." And here's an original poem

written by him, and published apparently in the old Weidman Messenger:

Last week you knew 'twas icy. The ground was just like lard We fell where we stood with an armful of wood

And slid all over the yard.
