NO CIVIL RIGHTS FOR PEOPLE OF BLANCHARD

The United States has turned itself inside out to guarantee voting rights to the Negro, while the State of Michigan, through the infamous 1964 Act of the Legislature, under pressure from the State Department of Education, took away voting rights of rural Michigan people.

You have lost your vote in the local school-district elections. You must now vote along with other, bigger districts which will make the decisions for the school-

ing of your children. No more poignant evidence of this fact could be offered than Monday's election returns involving the Blanchard School District and the State-dictated Reorganization regulations now effective.

The Blanchard vote involved many school districts, overshadowed by the large Edmore district. The vote, on whether or not to consolidate the Blanchard District into this new "Intermediate District", was 1,912 Yes for the entire huge area involved, to 1,648 No for the area. Even the big-area people are not completely sold on the proposition.

The little district of Blanchard voted a whopping 389 No to 61 Yes. But the little district of Blanchard is not to be considered in its desires. The State has spoken, and the Montcalm "Intermediate District" swallows up Blanchard no matter how Blanchard people feel about it.

Weidman's school election will come up June 13, when taxpayers of the Weidman District will vote along with the overwhelming odds of Barryton, Remus and Mecosta on whether Weidman becomes part of Mecosta County and the proposed but indefinite Great New School.

The Weidman District is divided on this issue, so it is expect-ed it will vote for the huge consolidation and merger into Mecosta County. Barryton District turned down a consolidation proposition three times, but that district also is divided.

The Remus-Mecosta vote will be solid, a Yes vote to take us in, naturally.

You can vote in the Weidman School election June 13, and we urge you to do so. But the result is already written.

One day you'll be in a single state-wide school district. This is "progress". You'll have no vote, but you'll be modern, you'll be in the swim, you'll be up with the times.

Weidman Slates Summer School For 80 Students

WEIDMAN — The Weidman Community School has completed plans for a summer school which will serve approximately so students.

This program is made available under the provisions of Public Law 89 · 10 Title 1 of the Elementary - Secondary Education Act of 1965. Under this Act, the Weidman School will receive a grant of \$19,067.20. Final approval was received March 24, 1966. The maximum basic grant for Isabella County was \$171,128.12.

Summer school will begin on June 20 and run for six weeks. Transportation will be provided for all students and there will be no charge to the students.

The money is a Federal grant, as is also a library grant for \$544.19.



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FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS OF VILLAGE INCORPORATION (Fourth in a series of articles explaining the pros and cons of village incorporation, as advo-cated by the Weidman Business Association. These articles were researched and written by Attorney Stephen Fox, at the WBA's request.)

Every community which is contemplating incorporation is vitally interested in how incorpor ation will affect it financially. Listed below are the important financial considerations associated with incorporation.

1. As mentioned earlier, incorporation provides the legal authority to levy taxes sufficient to defray the cost of providing those services that the people want and are willing to pay for.

The Home Rule Act limits the total tax levy for operating purposes to 20 mills or \$20 per \$1,-000 of assessed valuation.

This is important, because the township, no matter how de-manding its citizens are for services, and no matter how willing they are to pay for such services, may not levy more than the County Allocation Board will permit. Usually this amounts to from one to three mills. It can readily be seen that the township cannot provide much service or a very high level of service to its residents with such limited financail resources.

2. The village would receive its proportionate share of the sales tax moneys which now are returned entirely to the township. These funds would be divided between the village and the township in proportion to the population residing in the

new village and the balance of the township. Sales tax returns amount to approximately \$6.71 in 1961-62 per capita based on the 1960 census.

3. The village would also receive its proportionate share of the intangibles tax moneys which currently go entirely to the township. This would also be divided in the manner outlined above, and amounts to approximately \$1.18 per capita.

4. Eighty-five per cent of the moneys collected for liquor licenses in the village would be returned to it for enforcement of the State Liquor Law.

5. Furthermore, the village will receive funds now going to the County Road Commission for the maintenance and improvement of streets within the incorporated area. The amount each community receives depends on several factors, including major and local street mileage, 1960 census of the area, and equivalent state trunkline mileage. Accurate information regarding the amount of funds that will be returned to the incorporating community may be obtained by consulting the County Road Commission and the State Highway Department. Current gas and weight tax returns amount to approximately \$1,534 per mile for major streets, \$410 per mile for local streets, and \$4.35 per capita on the 1960 census.

6. Incorporation would not change the administration or financing of social welfare (relief) which, in most counties, is handled on a county-wide basis.

7. Incorporation would have absolutely no effect on school district boundaries or school administration.

RESPONSIBILITIES THE VILLAGE ASSUMES

A new village must assume certain legal functions such as providing for village elections, assessing property for village tax purposes, and collecting village taxes. It must also assume the responsibility for maintaining local streets, but not county or state roads within its boundaries. As mentioned, before, the village will receive funds from the State for assuming this obligation.

Finally, the village will assume such other responsibilities that the taxpayers want, such as police and fire protection, regulation of sanitation and health,

community recreation, etc. However, creating a new village does not in itself force any expense on the community, except the nominal overhead cost of providing the legally required functions mentioned.

Generally, the moneys that are returned to the village from state sources are more than enough to cover the latter expenses.

Conclusion A new village and its services will, of course, require the payment of taxes to provide those municipal services that the people in the area need, which services are not now available or are performed inadequately.

However, the obvious reason for incorporating is to provide the legal base for obtaining these services and the means for distributing the costs in an equitable manner.

In brief, village government can cost just as little--or just as much--as the citizens of the area determine through their representatives on the Village Council.
