SPORTING FISHERMEN SEEM TO BE DISAPPEARING

Traditionally, fishermen are a breed of generous, considerate sportsmen, willing and ready to help a fellow angler in time of trouble.

An experience of Dr. Vincent Brown and Dr. Pat Garrity of Mt. Pleasant and Caro leads us to wonder if the old breed is dying out.

Drs. Brown and Garrity were fishing at Sand Point on Saginaw Bay this summer, in Dr. Brown's big high-powered boat, when suddenly the boat's battery went dead.

They were among a fleet of 15 other big boats, fishing for perch on the Bay, and when the two discovered their plight, they began yoo-hooing at the other 15 boats anchored nearby.

Not one of the boats' occupants paid any attention. Finally, Dr. Brown offered \$5 for a tow, and at the top of his lungs.

Still no response.

The other boats had a wall of deafness around them, their occupants went on fishing, taking no note of the disabled boat asking for help.

Fortunately, the water was calm. The two dentists finally took their folding chairs which were standard equipment on board, and used them as paddles to get the big boat slowly near the shore.

In shoulder-deep water they tied ropes to the boat, jumped overboard and hauled the boat near enough to shore so they could tow it while themselves walking on dry ground.

They towed it a mile and a half by man-power on the two ropes, when finally a boat from outside--not one of the 15 fishermen's outfits--came along and towed it the rest of the way, about a mile.

Makes us wonder if sportsmanship is going the way of many other decent aspects of our lives in this day and age.





Dick and Dorothy spent a week fishing on the Salmon River, at the main lodge, where they were joined by Dr. and Mrs. Nance Sept. 19. Then the men flew from Challis, Idaho, to the primitive area where the big game is hunted.

Dick got his big elk Sept. 22, using a bugle call to hure the bull during the mating season. He used three shots at the charging animal, one at 150 yeards, and the last one at 50 yards. "It just kept coming at me," Dick said. The bull had a herd of elk cows which he was protecting in his fashion, and the bugle call of a competing male elk brought the big bull charging over.

Dressed out, the elk weighed 419 pounds. Last year's elk Dick brought home dressed out at 625 pounds of meat.

The hunting party also brought back two mule deer.

Dr. Nance and Dick left the main ranch with packers, a guide, and on horseback, with pack horses, heading for a spike camp eight miles distant.
