MRS BERTHA CLARK--We took this photo of Mrs. Clark a year ago in May, on the occasion of her 90th birthday. She passed away early Monday morning, at 12.45, at the Medical Facility in Mt. Pleasant. She had been in and out of the hospital during the past year. She was widely known, and was loved by everyone. She was one of our last pioneer citizens. She was 91.

Bertha Reynolds was born in Clinton County, Michigan, May 26, 1879. In 1898 she was united in marriage to J. H. (Bert) Clark, in Sherman Township, and they made their first home in Brinton, then a thriving village. He taught the Brown School a few years, and later owned a grocery and hardware store, later selling the grocery part but keeping his hardware.

Then he attended veterinary college in Grand Rapids and graduated as a doctor of veteri-

The family moved to Weidman where they spent five years, and then moved to Pontiac, where Dr. Clark had a small-animal hospital and cared for horses on estates around Pontiac. The family lived there about 15 years.

They returned to Weidman in 1931, and built the home that is the Clark homestead in Weidman. Dr. Clark died in July of

Before his death, the couple had celebrated both their 50th and 60th wedding anniversaries. Mrs. Clark was quite alert and well until last January, when she fell and broke her knee. After that she was an invalid.

Surviving are six children: Harold Clark, Lela Whearett, Lucille Shackleford of Denver, Colo., Herbert Clark of Plymouth, Virgil Clark of Orlando, Fla., and Donald, at home.

SWIMMING POOL REJECTED 3 TO 1 IN SCHOOL VOTE

The Chippewa Hills Schools Board of Education's request for bonding the district to the tune of \$380,000 for a swimming pool in the new high school building was soundly defeated by voters, nearly three to one.

Gordon Fosburg was elected to a four-year term on the Board. Re-elected were Harry Gardner and David Dunlop.

In the Weidman precinct, Ivan Allen won the most votes but lost in the overall district. The vote for Mr. Allen reflects the discontent of this area, inasmuch as he published a paid advertisement in the school's shoppers guide last week listing his disappointments at the way the

school has been run.
In the Weidman precinct, embracing the townships of Coldwater, Gilmore, Sherman, Nottawa, Deerfield and Broomfield, or parts of them, Mr. Allen received 222 votes, Mr. Fosburg

In the district-wide vote, David. Dunlop received 737 votes, Gordon Fosburg 636, Harry Gardner 628, Ivan Allen 621, John Carson 576, and Geo. Lacey 489.

On the pool issue (bonding the district) the vote was: Yes: 382. No: 1,038. The Board allowed non-taxpayers to vote on this issue, and in the Weidman precinct they voted: Yes 8, No 4. ---0---



HISTORICAL MUSEUM

The following piece on Brinton was read at a meeting at the Big Rapids Historical Museum last week. It was given the historical society for the occasion by Mrs. Ruth Blesch of Barryton, and is a treasured relic in her collection.

Attending the meeting were Mrs. Blesch and daughter, Jo Alkofer, and Mrs. Ethel Soper, all of Barryton. Mrs. Soper is a charter member of the historical society. She and Mrs. Benedict of Chippewa Lake were on the refreshment committee for last

week's meeting.

about John Fitch in the old days
of Brinton, and how he had a casket made especially for him so
he could lie on his side in his
grave.

Here's the piece as presented: "BRINTON, HERE I COME!"

By Mrs. Edith Kennedy Hello, Brinton, here I come! Oh yes, I remember when Brinton was much larger and had two churches, a hotel, a saloon, a Maccabee Hall, and IOOF Hall; a meat market, post office, several stores, and perhaps a hundred families.

Any direction you went were saw mills and lumber camps, and there were several coal kilns (charcoal) that made coal from the hardwood off the lands, and a railroad came in from Saginaw to haul out the coal.

There was John Fitch's blacksmith shop, Sherm Morse's harness shop, the Cora Beers milliner store (and did Al Beers have a barbershop chair?).

Susan Hotchkiss made homebaked goods of all kinds for sale, and Mary Jane Hammond and Aunt Kate Sowle were the midwives who helped bring lots of little folks to Brinton, and the country, too.

Mr. Vander Griff was mail carrier from Lake, and carried passengers, too, in the mail coach.
The first IOOF Hall burned

The first IOOF Hall burned down and Seth Daly lost his life in the fire.

A good many oyster suppers and masquerade dances were held in the IOOF Hall, and drew large crowds who had good times.

In most of the stores you could get clothing, nails, spikes, axes, saws, tarpaper, and of course salt pork; bacon, bar soap and flour, molasses by the gallon, and kerosene, tobacco and cigars (no cigarets), and a few medicines such as salts and sulphur.

The first newspaper I remember was the Saginaw Courier, and I coaxed my dad to subscribe for it so I could have something besides the Almanac to read. I learned my ABCs and primer in the White School, with Ernest Tanner as my teacher. My First Reader I learned in the Brinton School. John J. Morey was my teacher there, then the Case School, but I finished up in the Conley School, and got married in 1900.
