ECHOES OF THE OLD DAYS.

In December of 1959, Ray Shook was advertising ring bologna at 39 cents a pound; precooked picnic hams at 29 cents a pound; bathroom tissue at four rolls for 29 cents.

Adams' IGA Store was advertising tuna fish (Del Monte) at four cans for a dollar; center cut pork chops at 59 cents a pound; sliced pork liver at 25 cents a pound; sliced bacon at 33 cents a pound; onions at 19 cents for three pounds; and margarine at eight pounds for a dollar.

DIDJA KNOW DEPT.

Did you ever wonder where the term, "varsity team," re-ferring to first-string high school athletic teams, came from? Ye Ed is old enough to remem-

ber. Back in The Old Days, a "var-

sity" team was the first-string team of a university. The word "university" was shortened to "varsity" by news writers and sports fans generally.

But a "varsity" team could only exist on a university campus.

Today every high school has a "varsity" team; and the kids of today haven't the faintest idea of the meaning of the word, or its origin. ****

During the 1930s till about the 1960s, colleges and universities taught, in their journalism classes, that the symbol "30" should be placed at the end of every news story.

Ye Eds remembers where that came from, too. Back in the very old days, a reporter wrote "30" at the end of his last news story, meaning, "Copy's all in for the day".

Ye Ed remembers when the Publisher's Auxiliary, a trade paper, printed its obituaries under the simple heading, "30". It meant that those people whose obituaries appeared on that page had turned in their last piece of copy (or newspaper work of any kind). Period.

YOU CAN ORDER LICENSE TABS BY MAIL: ISABELLA COUNTY GETS TAX CREDIT Last autumn, after ordering our personal auto license plates by mail, we were questioned as to whether the tax money from such a purchase would go into some fund of the state generally, or would it come back to Isabella County where it belongs?

And so, having received this year's completely made-out application form for the car license (this year it's a tab), we sat down and wrote to Richard H. Austin, Secretary of State, personally, asking him the ques-tion of where the tax monies on mail-purchased car licenses go. So we received a letter very

shortly in reply. Here 'tis: Dear Ms. Skinner: (Ed's note:

We don't go for that Ms. bit, but we always open letters ad-dressed to "Ms.")

Your letter of November 12 has been referred to this division for reply. An individual may purchase li-

cense plates in any of our branches in Michigan or by direct mail The application indicates the owner's county of residence. Counties are assigned a number which appears in the upper right hand corner of the application. This insures a distribution of registration fees back to the county in which the. owner lives, regardless of where the license plates were purchased.

I am forwarding a copy of a county code chart for your information. Sincerely, Jack D. Best




