State police have been investigating the breakins of three Weidman business places which occurred some time late last Wednesday night or early Thursday morning.

Broken into and robbed were
Baumann's IGA Store, the Idle
Hour Bar and Weaver's Tavern.

Keith Baumann told the Messenger that \$111 in change was stolen, along with 20 cartons of cigarets.

Betty Palmer said the thieves got 12 cases of whisky, five cases of beer, two cartons of cigarets and \$35 in cash. The thieves also wrecked the front door of the Idle Hour Bar, or Palmer's, and a new one would have to be purchased, Mrs. Palmer said.

Evelyn Hackney told the Messenger that Weaver's Tavern lost \$400 in cash, a few cigarets and her Michigan Lottery money, but the thieves left lottery tickets and records.

The breakin of Baumann's store was discovered by a truck driver at about 5 a.m. as he drew up to deliver goods to the

Police have not solved the pharmacy robbery.



MEETINGS SET TO HELP SENIOR CITIZENS ON TAX EXEMPTION PAPERS

Sherman Township officials have set Tuesday afternoon, Dec. 18, for Senior Citizens of the township to get help on their tax forms for homestead exemption.

The meeting will be held at the Weidman Elementary school cafeteria, from 2 to 4 p.m., with people urged not to plan to all come at the same time, if possible. There will be no speakers, but two aides from the Commission on Aging will be there to help individuals fill out their tax exemption papers, which go to the state instead of to the local Township Supervisor as before. Exemption forms will be available at the meeting. Anyone 65 years old or over is eligible to claim the tax exemption on his or her home only.

This will be the only meeting to aid home owners in making out the state forms, it was announced this week. Bobbie Oplinger said she would be there to be of what help she can.

Those not certain of their 1973 total income should attend anyhow, Bobbie said in a telephone interview. Get your papers and be ready and able to fill them out, she advises.

Nottawa Supervisor Ernest Schmidt announces a similar meeting for his township Senior Citizens, at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Beal City on Mon-

day, Dec. 17, from 2 to 4 p.m. Cizizens will pay real estate taxes as billed by the townships but if claims are made according to the regulation forms, monies will be refunded according to in-dividuals' income and taxable property. Some say that, if the state forms are filled out properly and sent in promptly, refunds might be forthcoming before the tax deadline arrives. This is admittedly an "iffy".

It is important, it was stressed in the interview, that Senior taxpayers get their papers to be filled out, even if they don't plan to make out an income report and make their tax payments until January.

If this sounds confusing, we claim it is. Best thing to do is attend the meeting in your township and get instructions and help--also the state papers neces ---0---

To Whom It May Concern: It is with much anger and concern that we write this protest about a problem that has grown very much out of proportion in the school systems in the State of Michigan.

We are referring to high school sports, which we are very much in favor of, but the hardship they place on some is very unreasonable and quite unneces-

We live in a very large consolidated school district and are many miles from the high school This is our oldest child's first year in high school sports, and already we are in a state of confusion. All high school sports are practiced after school hours on every night of the week.

This district did not vote for

the millage in the last election, so of course one of the first things dropped was the shuttle bus which brought those in sports back to their home towns. Many people live five to 10 miles from their home town. When you compound that with another 10 or 15 to the high school, the mileage to and from every night of the week gets to be more than many can manage.

The parent who must spend an hour on the road must also play a guessing game as to when the child gets through with practice or scrimmage or whatever the group might be doing that night. After driving many miles we have sat in a cold car (because of a gas shortage) for an hour waiting for our child to get through, while supper burned at home on the stove. If high school sports are important

enough to be practiced every day, why are they not added to the daily school curriculums as are other important subjects? Those who do not live in the inner circle of a school district are very much discriminated against. Perhaps it is not intentional, but facts are facts.

It also looks as if the energy crisis will be around for a long time. This is another good reason why the State of Michigan and the school districts should take a long hard look at their high school sports policy.

We need answers that all parents and students can live with. Surely there are many students who are denied the privilege of participation in sports because of the drawbacks mentioned above.
