THINK YOU'RE OLD?
TRY COLLEGE COURSES

Mid-Michigan College at Harrison has a little brochure on the subject of "old dogs learning new tricks".

If you think you're too old to learn something new, think again. Dr. Irma Halfter, a De Paul University psychologist, has proved that older adults do about 10 percent better, in the same circumstances, the same classrooms, than their younger companions.

Her study of learning ability covered virtually every field of activity: Business, communications, education, humanities, modern languages, natural science, mathematics, nursing, professional art, professional music, and social studies.

Sex, she says, makes no difference in learning ability. She says, "Older women gave a superior total performance and a superior performance in each of the fields of study. In particular, the older women earned more A's than the younger women, and had an approximately equal percentage of B's and C's, and a lesser percentage of D's and F's."

One of Dr. Halfter's pet peeves is the business of college for

everybody.

She says, "One of my pet gripes at industry is that they don't need college graduates.

They have so routinized industry that the college degree is really foolishness. I think all of society is on the wrong kick on this.

College is a way to keep young people out of the labor force, but industry has so routinized jobs that decision making is gone."


Her important contribution is that our ability to learn is not impaired with advance of years.

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RABIES CLINIC IN WEIDMAN DEC. 10

The annual clinics for dog rabies inoculations which began in Mt. Pleasant Dec. 4, go on through Shepherd Dec. 6, Winn on Dec. 11, and Weidman Dec. 10, at the Weidman Fire Hall.

The clinics will start at 7 p. m. and continue till 9 p.m. There is a new tough doglicense ordinance in Isabella County, and dog owners must have licenses for all dogs for the year 1974. Licenses may be purchased at all the rabies clinic in the county, at the time of the inoculation. License fees are \$5.00 for male and female dogs and \$2.00 for

unsexed dogs.

Dog owners must show proof of inoculation against rabies within the past three years before being issued licenses for 1974.

This year's clinics will be conducted by veterinarians in Isabella County, with co-operation of the Central Michigan District Health Department and the Isabella County Humane Society. A charge of \$3.00 will be made for each inoculation, with proceeds donated by the veterinar-(Continued on Next Page)

The new dog-license law is tough, and will be enforced, for the first time in many years. Dog owners will be listed by Township Supervisors as they go about their property assess ment duties, and the list will be turned in to the County Treasurer's office.

The County Treasurer, under the new law, will make lists of licensed and unlicensed dogs in the county, and turn the list of unlicensed dogs over to the Isa-bella Humane Society March 1, expiration of the license-obtain-

ing period.

The Humane Society personnel have been empowered legally to take the list of unlicensed dogs March 1, write letters of warning to the dog owners not licensed, and, after a specified time limit, go out and pick up any and all unlicensed dogs and take them to the animal shelter in Mt. Pleasant to be killed.

Dog owners who want to keep their animals can get the rabies inoculation shots easily at any of the rabies clinics, or take animals to veterinarians; then they must buy licenses for each dog they own, if they want to keep them.

The law in Isabella County will be enforced during the coming year.


