INFLATION CATCHES UP WITH THE MESSENGER

For over nine years the Weidman Messenger has gone along on subscription rates that were fairly high for a small-town weekly paper, though advertising rates were ridiculously low.

During the past two weeks the facts of inflation have caught up with us, in the form of a hundred percent raise in printing costs.

At first we were floored, unable to plan or decide what to do.

We finally decided to see if people really want the Messenger, and we've placed realistic pricing on everything, across the board.

We didn't raise subscriptions 100 percent, but by two dollars a year locally. (Inflation being what it is, a couple of dollars per year isn't much.)

Outside subscribers will pay a little more, and we shall see if our readers want the Weidman paper enough to pay more.

For us it's a matter of survival, maybe. For readers and advertisers it's a decided aggravation.

We feel for all of us.

The big hike in printing costs is occasioned by several factors: There is panic in the printing trade, due to shortages of printing papers and the necessity of raising printers' paychecks as the grocery bills close in on workers' families.

We depend on Canadian mills for 65 percent of our newsprint supply, and the Canadian railroads have been on strike as well as some Canadian paper mills.

Paper mills in the United States are running at full capacity, but they have not enlarged their potentials in recent years and can't supply the nation's needs for paper.

That's the picture nationally. Here at the Messenger we're not certain we can cut it even with the price hikes.

If advertisers and subscribers want to give it a try, we'll try,

The Lake Isabella group did not show up at the meeting, and an opinion poll was taken which showed unanimous refusal of any such responsibility for the Township of Sherman in a private land development.



Senior citizens (age 65 and over) who own homes or rent can estimate from this chart how large a rebate they can expect to claim from the state under the tax relief program that takes effect Jan. 1. Here is how to use the chart: First, find the figure in the left-hand column closest to the amount of income your household will have in 1973. Next, pick the figure in the top row that comes nearest the amount of property tax you are paying on your residence. (If you are a renter, calculate 17 percent of your yearly rent and choose the figure in the top row nearest that amount.) Third, follow the chart. That is approximately the rebate you can expect to claim.

It is to be remembered that this year's tax exemption for Senior Citizens will be made as usual, on your regular tax bills received through the mail.

The above schedule of figuring is for next year, i.e., the taxes figured on the 1973 for payment in 1974. This year's taxes are already figured, but next year

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we go into Gov. Milliken's complicated "tax relief" program for Senior Citizens, which demands a state-income-tax declaration even though your income is so low you don't pay state income taxes. The state wants to know all about your income, and it will figure what tax deductions you're eligible for, based on the figures shown above.

We understand everyone will receive state-printed forms this fall for income declarations for taxation purposes next year.

For instance, according to the figures in the above table, a per son or couple having \$3,000 annual income or less from any source would be entirely exempt from paying any real estate taxes if his home is not now taxed at more than \$500.

Five hundred dollars is the maximum exemption for any reason, we understand (not that we claim to understand a whale of a lot about the whole thing).

Your property tax is shown in the black type above, at the top of the table, reading across.

Your income is in the first col-

umn, beginning with \$1,000, and reading down to catch the figure nearest your annual income.



By the time he moved away, Mr. Damon had connections with the Weidman Banking Company, the Holmes Milling Company, and was a director of the Isabella County State Bank of Mt. Pleasant. He was instrumental in the building of the Methodist Church in Weidman.

Weidman's first hardware store was built by George H. Fisher. At one time two hotels operated profitably here, with livery

stables as part of the hotels;
Among other early settlers here was Mrs. Anna Schmidt, later legally changed to Smith, who was born in Austria, near Vienna. She came to America in 1902 and stayed in New York City. In 1903 she married Karl Schmidt

Mrs. Schmidt repaired shoes for the village of Weidman, during which time she improved her home and workshop, educat-

ed her two boys, and was a most respected woman here, for her courage and hard work.

Other first-settlers included Charles Woolworth (harness shop), George Drallette, general store (meat market first), Steve Rau, hardware; John Otterbine, barber; Floyd Mitchell, Mr. Weidman's nephew and bookeeper and clerk in the first supply depot before stores were built. It was the "office building" for the Weidman mills, with basic food staples stored in the back and Mr. Mitchell waiting on food customers between his bookeeping chores.

Floyd Mitchell's rise was rapid, and he was president of the Weidman Bank, owned stock in the Holmes Milling Company and the lumber yard, after the sawmills were gone.

Charles Woolworth came in 1897. George Drallette was here a little before that, buying Gerard's meat market and developing it into a general store; George Middlesworth brought his general store here from Brinton in 1896 or thereabouts.
